Game 1

(National Division)

St. Bernard High School, LA 56 Gulf Coast High School, FL 37

(Binghamton, NY)- The 10th annual STOP-DWI Holiday Classic started off slow with two national division teams squaring off on the unfamiliar floor of the Broome County Veterans Memorial Arena. A combined 58 turnovers summed up the game as St. Bernard beat Gulf Coast High 56-37. Senior Brandon Enclarde standing at 5' 10," finished with 16 points, and Troy Douglass who had 12 points both led the Eagles of St. Bernard. Gulf Coast High's Adam Bollenbeck was the only Shark to score in double digits shooting 7-8 from the field and finishing with 15 points.

Game 2

(Binghamton, NY)- The first game of The STOP-DWI Holiday Classic Regional Division I tournament had the Vestal Golden Bears facing off against the Wildcats of West Genesee.

The first quarter began with Vestal jumping too a quick 4-point lead due to their tough defense and smart shot selection. However, West Genesee's Mark Boll took over hitting back to back bombs from behind the arc. Boll scored 10 of his teams 13 points including a dunk at the buzzer to bring the wildcats ahead at 13-7. The second quarter was all Vestal. Patiently attacking West Genesee's 2-3 zone, the Golden Bears went on a tear scoring 18 points limiting the Wildcats to only 3. Each team came out attempting to control the tempo of the game. St. Raymond's tried to run and gun, while Frankfort wanted to settle it down and work for open shots. The Ravens from St. Raymond had the edge, taking a 20-13 lead after the first frame with 6'2" junior Louie McCroskey taking 9 points. Frankfort hung tough, utilizing their crisp passing game to open up opportunities. Chris Current, a Kentucky honorable mention All-State selection last year, had 7 in the first quarter for the Panthers.

Frankfort came out in opportune fashion in the second quarter, converting Raven turnovers to tie the game at 28 with 1:53 to play. Watertown jumped out to an 11-2 lead with 2 minutes left in the first thanks in large part (no pun intended), to their big men, 6'9 Matt Gorman and 6'7 Sid Pond. UE struggled to defend down low, which allowed for 2 Gorman dunks and numerous Sid Pond rebounds.
