The 2005 STOP-DWI Holiday Classic tipped off with Regional action pitting the Saints of Seton Catholic against the Tigers of Union Endicott. Seton returns three starters from last year's STAC Championship team, Jim Torto, Matt Cline, and Jerome Gosney. Union Endicott is guided by first year head coach Kevin McManus, who posted an impressive 84-39 record with the Tigers' JV squad.

Union Endicott got off to a sloppy start in the first quarter, managing just four points, all courtesy of senior Adam Skonieczki. The Tigers struggled against Seton's intense defense; however, the Saints were only able to pull ahead to a 12-4 lead by quarter's end. Endicott rallied briefly in the second quarter but Seton responded with a 7-1 run to finish the half. Seton's D.J. Lane capped the scoring with a three pointer at the buzzer, bringing the score to 27-15 going into the break. The Tigers were plagued by poor shooting in the first half, shooting a dismal 23.8% from the field, while both teams struggled to control the ball, turning the ball over a combined 22 times.

The Tigers were unable to gain any ground in the third quarter, equaling the 12 points the Saints put up heading into the fourth down 39-27. The final quarter was much of the same as the Saints maintained their lead thanks in large part to Matt Cline's seven points, running away with a 54-38 win. Cline led all scorers with 17 points, while Skonieczki led the Tigers with 13.

The Saints move on to the Regional Division I Championship Thursday at 7:30, while the Tigers will play the consolation game tomorrow morning at 9:30.

National Division play began with the Eagles of Landstown squaring off against the Clippers of Xaverian. The Eagles are led by a trio of seniors, Rushad Phillips, Theo Baker, and Percy Harvin, while Providence bound Brian McKenzie fronts the Clippers.

Xaverian came out on fire in the first quarter, scoring 14 unanswered points in the first five minutes sparked by a pair of Brian McKenzie three pointers. The Clippers would finish the quarter up 18-4 with all but one starter scoring. The Eagles made an adjustment in the second, slowing the Clipper's offense with a trapping half court defense and jumpstarting their offense to pull the score to 27-20 going into the half. Harvin and Horace Fields led the Eagle's charge, each scoring eight first half points, while McKenzie led all first half scorers with 11, converting three of six shots from behind the arc.

In the third quarter it was Landstown's turn to go on a run. The Eagle's scored 13 straight points in the first three and a half minutes of the quarter, taking their first lead of the game, 30-27, in the process. The Clippers kept it close, again led by the outside shooting of Brian McKenzie, to pull within one, 42-41, with 2:47 left in the third. However, the Eagles ended the quarter with six straight to take a 48-41 lead going into the fourth. The Clippers eventually came back in the final quarter, led by Brandon Romain and McKenzie. Romain pulled Xaverian within three with just less than three minutes to play in the game, but Landstown would not back down. After retaking a six point lead on a pair of Percy Harvin free throws, Brian McKenzie and Jamie Mercier-Blanchad both knocked down jump shots to pull within two with a minute left, but that would be as close as the Clippers would come. Landstown overcame their first quarter woes to come back and win 66-62. Brian McKenzie finished with a game high 26 points, shooting an impressive six for ten from three point land in the losing effort. Horace Fields and Percy Harvin finished with 23 and 21 respectively for the Eagles.

Landstown moves on to the National Division Semi-Finals tomorrow against Villa Angela St. Joseph High School. Xaverian will play in the consolation bracket tomorrow at 1:00 pm against Friendly High School from Maryland.

The second game of National Division play saw the Kentucky based Flyers from Franklin County High School tipping off against the Senators from Taft High School out of Cincinnati, Ohio. Franklin County is let by four returning senior starters, fronted by the big inside presence of 6'7" Paul Chambers who blocked 55 shots during the 2004-2005 season. Also leading the Flyers is 6'5" Chase Straw averaging 13 points per game to go along with eight rebounds. The Senators are led by four returning starters highlighted by first team All-State star Heath White who averages 23 points, seven rebounds and six assists per game. White also took home the title in the 2005 STOP-DWI Dunk Contest.

First quarter action featured a fast paced tempo with each team running the floor to the tune of a 23-18 Taft lead at quarters end. The intense play blossomed at 3:48 with an explosive ally oop dunk by White, taking the pass from Eddie Gray. White tallied eight points in the quarter, four of which came off dunks. The Senators and White would not slow down in the second. White added another ally oop this time the assist coming from the hands of Monsonna Torbert. Franklin County came within four of the Senators at the half-way mark of the second quarter on a jump shot from Cy Hines, however, Taft would go on a 7-0 run to extend their lead back to 11. Franklin County's Eric May ended the half with a three pointer with 6.2 seconds left to draw the Flyers within six going into the break. White led all first half scorers with 14 on seven of eight shooting, and Straw was best the Franklin County attack with 12 points connecting on six of seven shots.

The Flyers quickly closed the deficit in the second half going on an 8-2 spurt, and finally tying it up at 46 with 4:36 left to play in the quarter. Both teams would trade baskets and the lead all throughout the rest of the third quarter. Heath White again went to the air at the end of the quarter, giving Taft a 59-56 lead heading into the final eight minutes. Taft held a one point lead for the last minute of play and White knocked down two late free throws to secure the 75-72 victory for the Spartans. Taft had four players scoring in double digits despite the team's failure to connect on a three pointer. Heath White had a game high 27 points finishing on 11 of 14 shooting, while Chase Straw had 16 points and 10 rebounds to lead the Franklin County Flyers.

Taft will move on to the National Division Semifinals Wednesday at 9:15 pm, and Franklin County will enter the consolation bracket playing at 2:45 Wednesday afternoon.

The second session of day one at the STOP-DWI Holiday Classic led off with a Regional Division I match-up between the Purple Tornadoes from Norwich and the Vestal Golden Bears. Norwich is coached by Mark Abbott, a Norwich grad who took the helm in 1986 and has led the Purple Tornadoes to 248 victories and two NYSPHSAA Class B Titles. Fronting his arsenal is Mike Abbott, averaging nine points a game, and Alex Paula who contributes ten points a game. Four returning starters head the charge for the Golden Bears including Chris Baltz, a 2004 All-Conference performer who averages 17 points and eight rebounds per game.

Both teams came out shooting in the early minutes of the game. Vestal's Nick Woitach hit two three pointers on consecutive trips down the floor, and Norwich's Ryan Benenati connected from beyond the arc with just under four minutes left in the first to tie the score at 8. Chris Baltz ended the first quarter scoring with a deep three to give Vestal the early 11-8 lead. Both teams started the second quarter slowly, but the scoring picked up midway through the quarter. Dan Jurik of Vestal knocked down two from beyond the arc including one on which he was fouled and was successful in finishing off the four point play. Benenati responded with two three pointers of his own to bring the Purple Tornadoes within five of the Golden Bears at the 2:45 mark. The Golden Bears took their largest lead, 28-16, after Baltz netted his second three of the game. Norwich creeped back but Vestal still held a 29-20 lead at the break. Benenati led all scorers in the half with 11, as the two teams combined for nine three pointers.

Norwich came out and dominated the start of the second half, going on a 10-0 run to take their first lead 30-29, since the opening bucket. Vestal responded with a run of their own, thanks to a five straight points from Nick Woitach, retaking the lead 36-30. They would trade baskets to end the quarter, Vestal up 41-35. Resilient Norwich refused to go away, as once again they were ignited by the three, this time coming off the hand of junior Robert Martin. Norwich re-took the lead 46-45 with 2:59 remaining when Paula nailed a jumper from just inside the three point line. On the ensuing possession Baltz made good on two free throws and Vestal was back out in front with a minute and a half left to play. With the game tied and 55 seconds on the clock, Baltz drove to the rim and what seemed to be an opportunity for a three point play, was erased by a charging foul. Chris McManus, after being quiet all night, came up with a huge three point play and Vestal's next possession and the Golden Bears climbed out in front and secured a 52-49 win.

Nick Woitach led all scorers with 17 points, and Ryan Benenati finished up with 16 points including six from downtown. Vestal advances to the Regional Division I Final against Seton Catholic Central on Thursday at 7:30 pm. Norwich falls into the consolation bracket and will face-off with Union-Endicott Thursday at 9:30 am.

The second National Division Semi-Final placed the Taft Senators against the Falcons of Bishop Ford. Bishop Ford knocked off the host Binghamton Patriots on day one, led by Quraan Davis' 21 points. Taft defeated Franklin County led by high flying Heath White's 27 points, highlighted by two jaw dropping ally-oops.

The Senators jumped out to an early 12-8 lead six minutes into the game on Heath White's powerful one handed dunk from the baseline, but Bishop Ford remained close, pulling within two, 14-12, on a Josh Dupuy floater in the lane at the end of the quarter. Dupuy caught fire in the second, connecting for seven points in the first two minutes as he served as the catalyst, propelling Bishop Ford to a 29-16 lead with 3:01 left to play in the half. The Falcons' defense shut down Heath White in the second quarter, holding Taft's star scoreless until Brandon Russ lobbed an ally-oop from near half court to White with just 35 seconds left in the half. The Senators managed nine points late in the half to keep it respectable, down 36-25 going into the break. Dupuy led all scorers with 15 first half points, shooting a perfect five for five from the free throw line. Despite his quiet second quarter, Heath White still ended with eight first half points to lead the Senators.

Midway through the third Heath White began warming up, hitting for five straight points, including a three point play to pull the Senators within six, 42-36 with 4:10 left in the quarter. Bishop Ford struggled to break Taft's pressure defense and the Senators came within a single point, 44-43 with just under a minute left on an acrobatic Heath White tip in. Kevin Purcell responded for the Falcons with a three point play, only to have Monsonna Torbert close out the scoring for Taft with a jump shot, leaving the score 47-45 heading into the final eight minutes. Torbert remained hot in the fourth, connecting on back to back three pointers to tie the game at 51 with 6:14 left to play. Both teams would continue to battle back and forth, with Taft regaining the lead for the first time on the heels of a six point run over a span of 30 seconds with 2:30 left in regulation. The Senators would increase their lead to as much as five, 65-60, but Josh Dupuy converted a pair of free throws to bring the score to 65-62 with just 41.2 seconds to play. Heath White missed the front end of a one and one opportunity with 10.2 seconds left that could have sealed the deal for the Senators, but instead Dupuy grabbed the long rebound and sped the length of the court and laid the ball off the glass to pull the Falcons within one, 65-64 with 2.2 seconds left. This would be as close as Bishop Ford would come, as Taft hung on for the victory. Heath White finished with a game high 21 and teammate Monsonna Torbert had 17 as Taft advances to the National Division Championship, tomorrow night at 9:30 pm against Landstown, Virginia. Josh Dupuy had 19 points to lead the Falcons, who will play against Villa Angela for third place tomorrow afternoon.

Day three of the 2005 STOP-DWI Holiday Classic got under way with a battle of the Patriots; host Binghamton High taking to the floor against Friendly High from Fort Washington, Maryland. Binghamton looked to rebound after a poor performance on day two with a loss to Franklin County High in which they committed 25 turnovers, and shot under 50% from the line. Friendly, who dropped their second game of the tournament to Xaverian High, hoped to salvage their trip to Binghamton with a win on the final day.

The first quarter was played evenly, both teams running the floor to the tune of a 17-15 Friendly advantage at quarters end. Binghamton managed to find a way through Friendly's trapping defense getting point production from out of all but one player. In the second quarter Friendly broke a 19-all tie with a 10-0 run, distancing themselves from Binghamton with 4:08 left in the half. Binghamton would creep back to within five, thanks to a late tip-in by Scott Valenta, going down 36-31 heading into the break. The 2005 STOP-DWI Holiday Classic Regional Division I final pitted the Seton Catholic Saints against the Vestal Golden Bears. The 2005 STOP-DWI Holiday Classic National Division Championship featured the Taft High Senators against the Landstown Eagles. Both teams won their first two games, Taft beating Franklin County from Kentucky, and Bishop Ford from Brooklyn, while Landstown came from behind in both their wins to beat Xaverian High out of Brooklyn and Villa Angela St. Joseph from Cleveland. High-flying dunk contest champ Heath White has led the Senators, averaging 24 points a game in the tournament, while Landsown guard Horace Fields has guided the Eagles, averaging 22.5 points per game.

The Senators came out shooting to start the first quarter, knocking down a pair of three pointers off the hands of Heath White and senior Eddie Gray to take an early 6-0 lead. The Eagles kept it close by scoring in half court sets, but Taft clearly controlled momentum, impressing the crowd with plays such as Brandon Russ's powerful reverse dunk with a minute left in the quarter.
