## Regional Division I

The Golden Bears of Vestal tipped off against the Windsor Black Knights in Regional Division action to start the 2006 STOP-DWI Holiday Classic. Vestal, the defending Regional Division I champions are coming off a 17-6 campaign in which they captured their first STAC Championship since 1968. The Black Knights, lead by third year coach Joe Costello, feature nine returning players highlighted by senior Brian O'Neil (9 ppg).

Both teams got off to a dismal start in the first quarter with Vestal holding onto a 12-7 lead at quarters end thanks to five Cameron Boyden points that fueled a 9-0 Vestal run. The scoring picked up in the second quarter as Windsor began its comeback riding the shoulders of Chipper Hurd. With 2:15 to play in the half Hurd cashed in a three from the top of the key to bring the score to 22-20 in favor of the Golden Bears. Vestal and Windsor would trade baskets and a late Vestal free-throw capped the first half scoring, and the Golden Bears went to the locker room with a 25-22 lead. Vestal shot poorly from the field connecting on only 34.6% as a team; however, the difference came at the foul line. Vestal made there way to the charity stripe 11 times in the first half to Windsor's three.

Windsor's Brian O'Neil had the hot hand coming out of the locker room knocking down two three pointers on the Black Knights' first two possessions giving Windsor their first lead of the game 28-27. The Windsor lead would be short lived as O'Neil and company would not continue their shooting success finishing a miserable 33.3% from the floor. Vestal pulled away down the stretch distancing themselves from the Black Knights and taking the first step in defending their title winning 49-41. Vestal's Corey Taylor finished with 14 to lead all scorers.

Vestal will head to the Regional Division I Championship game on Saturday at 7:30 against the winner of the Owego Free Academy/Seton Catholic Central game. Windsor falls to the consolation bracket and will play the loser of the Owego/Seton game Friday at 9:30am.

The first National Division action tipped off with a coast-to-coast battle – the Royals of Mission Prep High School in central California versus the Gaffney High Indians from South Carolina. Mission Prep is riding on six consecutive 20-win seasons and three straight CIF Championships. They are lead by 6'8" All-State senior Luis Santiago (13 ppg and 8 rbs). The Indians also boast an impressive record over the last three seasons, bringing home three 4A State Championships compiling an 81-3 mark over that time.

Mission Prep jumped out to a commanding lead in the first quarter, 18-3. The Royals' disciplined and crisp style of play provided open looks to the benefit of Santiago who tallied six quick points but was sat down for a majority of the half due to early foul trouble. Scott Williams led all scorers for Mission Prep with 10 first half points. The speedy Gaffney team began to find success in their run and gun pressure offense and full court press defense in the second quarter, forcing sloppy turnovers and converting at the free-throw line. Still, shooting only 14.7% from the field in the half, they failed to close the gap and went to the locker room down 31-18.

An energized Gaffney team came out of the blocks for the second half continuing to pressure the Royals into turnovers and creating easy baskets inside. Limiting Mission Prep to only four buckets in the third quarter, Gaffney rode the shoulders of Rodney Love who tallied seven third quarter points and set the tone with his tenacity on the boards. At quarters end, the Indians had climbed back into the contest only down five heading into the final frame.

A Love lay-up off a turnover capped the Gaffney comeback and with 4:30 remaining, the Indians took their first lead of the game. Santiago came right back with a dominant move inside and regained the lead for Mission Prep. After a flashy behind the back pass in the lane from Love to Ken Littlejohn put the Indians back on top momentarily, Mitch Woolpert finally connected from behind the arc putting the Royals back ahead by a possession, 46-44, with 3:17 left to play. On the next possession Santiago convert a tough three-point-play stretching the lead back out to five. A Love lay-in followed by Robert Butler's floater in the lane once again pulled the Indians within one. However, Santiago again stepped up converting inside and a last ditch effort failed Gaffney as their inspiring effort at a comeback came up just short, taking the loss 51-48. Mission Prep nearly beat themselves committing a staggering 32 turnovers in the contest while shooting a below average 38.8% from the field.

Love recorded a double-double (13 pts and 10 rbs) while Kobe Hollis lead the Indians with 15 points in the losing effort. Williams finished with 15 points for the Royals who advance to the semi-finals against the winner of the Boys and Girls High School and St.

Thomas Aquinas game. That game will be played at 7:30pm on Friday. Gaffney falls to the consolation bracket and will play at 1:00pm on Friday.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> game of National Division play saw the Owls of Towson Catholic tipping off against the Bulldogs from Paul Dunbar High. Towson features a team that produced a #9 ranking in the State of Maryland in 2005 and a 6'10" Syracuse bound Dante Greene who is averaging 12 rebounds and five blocks to go along with 23 points per game. A young Paul Dunbar team is led by juniors Dion Johnson (12 ppg) and De'Andre Webb (7ppg).

Towson dominated in the early goings jumping out to a 9-0 lead within the first two minutes of the game. At quarters end, the Owls had stretched their lead to 22-7 led by Greene's seven first quarter points. Paul Dunbar picked it up offensively in the second frame, but still couldn't slow down Greene underneath who finished the half with 12 points and nine rebounds. On 43.8% shooting from the floor, Towson headed to the locker room with a commanding 36-23 lead. Nick Hudson had 12 points in the first half for Paul Dunbar.

The second half featured much of the same play from both teams. The high-flying and explosive Towson team dominated the boards but, the Bulldogs still managed to trade baskets with the Owls keeping the game still within reach at the end of the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter. The offensive production from Towson flourished in the final quarter as they stretched out their lead to 22 with 5:40 left. Paul Dunbar would fail to make a comeback effort as the Owls were too strong down the stretch and cruised to an 80-62 victory. Greene finished with 25 points and 13 rebounds.

Both teams got out to a slow start, Seton failing to connect from the field until the 3:07 mark of the first quarter and sitting on two points at quarters end, down 10-2. However, in the second quarter, the Saints stormed back going on a 9-1 run to start the quarter and taking a 17-15 lead heading into the break. Keogh led all first half scorers with 10 points, and Furner was tops for Seton with six.

The second half featured little offensive production from either squad, each team trading baskets through the third quarter with the Saints hanging onto a slim lead. With less than two minutes remaining the Indians finally broke through and took the lead as the game hit its final stretch. Up two, Ryan Bullock found himself at the charity stripe for the Indians with 11.5 seconds to play looking to seal the win. However, he only connected on one of two and the Saints still had an opportunity to tie. With 2.2 seconds left Matt Meier was fouled during a three-point attempt and was sent to the foul line with a chance to send the contest to extras. Meier came up empty on all three free throws and the Saints took the opening round loss, 36-33.

Keough led all scorers with 19 points adding eight rebounds to his output. Meier was tops for the Saints with nine. Seton heads to the consolation bracket and will face Windsor on Friday at 7:30am. Owego Free Academy will face Vestal in the Regional Division I final on Saturday at 7:30pm.

Notably are 6'3" Martavis Kee, committed to Temple (23.3 ppg and 5 apg), and University of Miami football recruit Leonard Hankerson. The Kangaroos are led by 6'3" senior Kevin Mills (10ppg and 5 rbs) along with 6'7" classmate Wayne Allison (7ppg and 10rbs).

The first quarter was played evenly, featuring both teams going on small runs taking advantage of quick opportunities to run the floor. At quarters end, Boys and Girls held onto a four point lead, 18-14. Within two minutes, Windsor had closed the seven point seven point gap and the game was tied up again with 2:08 left to play.
