

Impact on Land - The communications facility will have a small to moderate impact on land. The total project area involves the disturbance of approximately 0.35 acres. Temporary disturbed surfaces will be restored to pre-construction conditions.

Impact on Agricultural Resources - The USDA classifies soils in the project footprint as Farmland of Statewide Importance. The project footprint is outside of active agricultural land, and the site will not interfere with existing farming practices. Given the small footprint of the project, no significant effect to agricultural land will occur.

Impact on Aesthetic Resources - The Public Archaeology Facility prepared a Phase I Cultural Resource Survey for the project on December 7, 2018. The report revealed the presence of no National Register Eligible (NRE) properties within 0.5 miles from the project; PAF concluded that the proposed tower will have no negative visual impacts to NRE properties. The report has been submitted to the New York State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) for review and approval. SHPO provided a letter of No Effect on December 19, 2018. In addition, the project is located in the viewshed of public thoroughfares and places in the Town of Colesville. No significant viewshed impacts associated with the tower are anticipated given: 1.) No clearing/grubbing of trees is required for construction; 2.) Existing vegetation and structures obscure the view of the project location; 3.) There are no designated NYS scenic byways in the vicinity of the project; 4.) The tower lighting is medium intensity and does not create atmospheric illumination.

Impact on Historic and Archeological Resources - The PAF Phase I survey included a review of prehistoric and historic cultural significance of the project location, as well as a review of the project's potential to effect NRE properties from a visual concern. The PAF report concluded that no sensitive archeological materials occur within the project footprint, and that no significant viewshed impacts associated with historic resources will occur. SHPO concurred with the findings of the Phase I and issued a letter of No Effect on December 19, 2018.

Impact on Energy - The proposed project requires electrical services; specifically, the project will require installing a 200 amp service. The project will comply with the NYS Energy Conservation Code. In addition, vehicle traffic to and from the project site will be minimal and will only occur during maintenance operations.

Impact on Lighting - The tower will be lit per Federal Aviation Administration requirements. The tower will have medium intensity tower obstruction lighting to comply with FAA guidelines. The lighting configuration will consist of a top-mounted White/Red LED lighting system and Red LED side lights. FAA standards have been developed to reduce impacts to migratory birds. It is not anticipated that the tower light will create a significant environmental effect given the light is medium intensity and does not create atmospheric illumination.

Consistency with Community Plans - The tower height currently exceeds the recommended allowable height and lighting regulations as designated in the Town Zoning Code. Broome County is coordinating with the Town of Colesville regarding this matter. The proposed height is required in order to meet design standards; the new tower increases public health and safety whose benefits outweigh concerns for height and lighting.







1.) Impact the character or quality of the existing community

The communications facility will have a small to moderate impact on land. The total project area involves the disturbance of approximately 0.5 acres. Disturbed surfaces from construction activities beyond the project footprint will be restored to pre-construction conditions.

The Public Archaeology Facility prepared a Phase I Cultural Resource Survey for the project on June 8, 2018. The report revealed no National Register Eligible (NRE) properties within 0.5 miles from the project; PAF concluded that the proposed tower will have no negative visual impacts to NRE properties. The report has been submitted to the New York State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) for review and approval, on July 16, 2018 the SHPO provided a letter of No Effect.

The project is located in the viewshed of public thoroughfares and places in the Binghamton area. No significant viewshed impacts associated with the tower are anticipated given: 1.) The tower location is adjacent to an existing tower; 2.) The tower is relatively low in height as compared to industry standards; 3.) No clearing/grubbing of trees is required for construction; 4.) Existing vegetation and structures obscure the view of the project location from a large portion of the viewshed area; 5.) There are no designated NYS scenic byways in the vicinity of the project. Lastly, the County has reviewed the potential visibility of the proposed tower from the vantage point of the residential neighborhoods in the immediate vicinity of the site and determined that the tower will be largely screened from most of the existing residences. During the public meeting conducted at the Broome County Public Library on October 10, 2018, most residents were not aware that an existing tower was located on the property and did not express concerns with regard to the potential visibility of the proposed tower.

The proposed project requires electrical services; specifically, the project will require installing a 200 amp service. The project will comply with the NYS Energy Conservation Code. In addition, vehicle traffic to and from the project site will be minimal and will only occur during maintenance operations.

The tower does not require lighting, and therefore no impacts will occur associated with lighting.

2.) Impact on Historic and Archeological Resources

The PAF Phase I survey included a review of prehistoric and historic cultural significance of the project location, as well as a review of the project's potential to effect NRE properties from a visual concern. The PAF report concluded that no sensitive archeological materials occur within the project footprint, and that no significant viewshed impacts associated with historic resources will occur. As previously stated, the SHPO provided a No Effect for the project on July 16, 2018.

The Ely Park Golf Course is not currently listed on the State or National Register of Historic Places. The County is not aware of any pending or previous nominations for the property to be included on either register. Regardless, the County's proposed replacement of its existing 911 communications tower currently on the property could reasonably be determined to have no significant adverse impact on the Golf Course. There have been aesthetically similar facilities on the property for many years and the County is including mitigation measures in its design to provide supplemental landscaping around the

facility to provide screening at ground level. In addition, the proposed facilities are located to better use existing natural screening at the site. The proposed construction of the new facilities (as a replacement to those currently on the property), is not considered a significant adverse impact on the Golf Course or surrounding area due to the visually similar nature of the facilities proposed and significant natural and proposed visual buffers that screen the facility from view.

This service agreement is for minimum of two (2) years, starting January 1, 2019 (or upon this agreement being signed by both parties) and ending December 31, 2020. This agreement may be renewed at the end of this term by agreement of both *BroomeINCLUDES* and Broome County IT.

In cases of disasters due to the "acts of god" or other *BroomeINCLUDES* system or equipment failure, Broome County IT is not financially responsible for the replacement of components or time and materials associated with this agreement.

All changes to this agreement must be authorized in writing by both the *BroomeINCLUDES* and Broome County IT.

If Broome County IT finds it necessary to alter this agreement due to a change in network and/or Internet connectivity, it will notify BroomeINCLUDES ninety (90) days in advance.

Responsibilities:

 Provide Broome County IT telephone and e-mail contact information with a representative of the BroomeINCLUDES or their agent. This person must be available to work with Broome County IT when necessary to help resolve any issues.

- Users and those with access to the County Network and Systems shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws.
- Anyone with access to the County Network and Systems shall also comply with the Broome County IT Security policy.
- 4. Only supported/approved hardware and software will be used.

Performance Measurements:

Support and Maintenance:

Broome County IT will respond within one (1) business day to all problems associated with the services provided and will schedule a time to fix the problem based on its severity and impact to daily functions. Broome County IT will provide Helpdesk support at (607) 778-2483 from 8:00am to 5:00pm Monday through Friday, excluding holidays.

- Support outside normal maintenance as described in the agreement may be billed at \$70.00/hour.
- Windows 7 and 10 are the only supported desktop/laptop operating systems at this time.
- Failure to provide supported/approved hardware/software or tampering with County supported or provided hardware/software will void the SLA portion of this agreement and any support offered will be "best effort" only.

Indemnification:

BroomeINCLUDES and the County each agree as follows:

- 1. BroomeINCLUDES shall not be liable or financially responsible, in any way, for County hardware, software, peripherals, equipment, supplies, etc. located at County sites.
- 2. Likewise, the County shall not be liable or financially responsible, in any way for BroomeINCLUDES hardware, software, peripheries, equipment, supplies, etc. located at BroomeINCLUDES sites.
- 3. 

Description of Legislative Action

Article 25-AA of the New York State Agriculture and Markets Law authorizes the creation and amendment of local Agricultural Districts following an application by the landowner and review and approval by the Broome County Legislature.

The purpose of the Agricultural District program is to encourage the continued use of farmland for agricultural production. The program is based on a combination of landowner incentives and protections which are designed to forestall the conversion of farmland to non-agricultural uses.
