WHEREAS, in 2015 Broome County obtained the Hillcrest Depot property located at 1177 and 1253 Hoyt Avenue in the Town of Fenton from the United States General Services Administration (GSA), and

WHEREAS, electric service was provided through a meter on the remainder of the property located at 1151 Hoyt Avenue and was owned and being paid by GSA, and

WHEREAS, in 2017 the GSA portion of the property was sold to Carrier Services Group and the electrical service was transferred to their name, and

WHEREAS, it was determined at that time that bringing in a separate electrical service and meters was cost prohibitive and the County agreed to reimburse Carrier Services Group for a percentage of the combined electric bill, and

WHEREAS, from time to time since March 2017 this County Legislature has authorized the Commissioner of Public Works to reimburse Carrier Services Group for the County's share of the electric bills, and

WHEREAS, most recently this County Legislature, by Resolution 59 of 2020, authorized the Commissioner of Public Works to reimburse Carrier Services Group for the County's share of electric bills at 1151 Hoyt Avenue in the Town of Fenton, in the amount of \$16,156.10, for the billing periods August 11, 2018 through November 8, 2019, and be it

WHEREAS, the Commissioner of Public Works requests authorization for an agreement between Carrier Services Group and Broome County for an Electric Usage Cost Reimbursement Memorandum of Understanding, at an amount not to exceed \$20,000 per year, for such a time as the County either relinquishes ownership of the property or individual electric service is constructed, and

Broome County is currently implementing a project to improve its existing public safety emergency communications system. The project is currently in the planning and design phase, and is being implemented to improve first responder radio system coverage for Law Enforcement, Fire, EMS, and Highway agencies in the Town of Kirkwood, Broome County.

In summary, the project consists of the following items:

- > Construction of one (1) new communication site on Kutalek Road, located in the Town of Kirkwood, New York, as noted below (and described in the attached documentation).





The facility shall consist of a 50' x 50' fenced compound within a 100' x 100' area which will be leased by Broome County, all of which shall be cleared and graded. A new 195-foot self-support communications tower shall be erected within the 50' x 50' compound. Along with the proposed tower, a variety of ancillary ground-based equipment shall also be constructed, including: a generator pad (4.5' x 11.5'), an equipment shelter (12' x 20'), and a 1,000-gallon propane tank mounted on a 4' x 16' concrete pad . Access to the site will use an newly constructed access road appropriate for access during construction and future maintenance activities.

A right-of-way easement will be 30 $\pm$ ft. wide for the access road and utility easements where applicable. Utilities will be installed underground within a trench running along access roads or the shortest route to nearest existing service point.

## **Memorandum of Understanding**

#### I. Purpose

The purpose of this Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is to define a working relationship between The American Red Cross (hereinafter "Red Cross") and Broome County, its lead Emergency Management agency (hereinafter Broome County Office of Emergency Services), and other departments, agencies, and offices in preparing for, responding to, and recovering from emergencies and disasters. This MOU provides the broad framework for cooperation and support between the Red Cross and the Broome County Office of Emergency Services in assisting individuals, families and communities who have been or could be impacted by a disaster or an emergency. It also provides the descriptions of readiness and response activities, such as planning, training, exercising and resourcing, and the clarification of roles and responsibilities of the Red Cross and Broome County to the community and other agencies.

#### II. Parties

#### A. Name of County, Parish or Local Jurisdiction

Broome County is located in the Southern Tier of New York. Broome is bordered by Cortland County to the North, Chenango County to the North East, Delaware County to the East, Pennsylvania to the South, and Tioga County to the West. There is a population of approximately 200,000 people over 715 square miles. There are nine square miles of water, four rivers which flow through the county: Susquehanna River, Chenango River, Otselic River, and Tioughnioga River and two major lakes, the Whitney Point Reservoir and Oquaga Lake.

Across the county there are three interstates (I-81, I-88, and I-86/Rt. 17), along with numerous railroad lines. Additionally, several pipelines cross the county with storage tank farms in the Town of Vestal. Broome County is host to several airports, including the Greater Binghamton Airport which has annually approximately 100,000 airline boardings. Broome County has 24 incorporated municipalities.

The Broome County Office of Emergency Services (OES) is the designated agency to coordinate all emergency management activities of the County. The Broome County Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan outlines the emergency management responsibilities for various County departments and agencies.

Broome County emergency management activities are conducted, in whole or in part, under these laws:

- Broome County Charter
  - o Broome County Resolution Number 05-640 (Resolution accepting the Broome County Emergency Operations Plan)
- New York State Executive Law, Article 2B
- New York State Defense Emergency Act, as amended
- Federal Civil Defense Act of 1950, PL 81-950 as amended
- The Disaster Relief Act of 1974, PL 93-288 as amended

- Federal Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, PL 100-707
- Post-Katrina Emergency Management Reform Act of 2006, PL 109-295
- Title III, of the Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act of 1986, PL 99-499 as amended

#### B. American Red Cross

#### 1. Services to help people prepare for, respond to, and recover from disasters

Founded in 1881, the Red Cross is the nation's premier nonprofit disaster management organization. As part of a worldwide movement that offers neutral and impartial humanitarian care, the Red Cross is a nongovernmental organization that mobilizes communities to aid people affected by or at risk of disasters with the aim of preventing and alleviating suffering. The Red Cross provides disaster cycle services without regard to race, color, national origin, religion, gender, age, disability, sexual orientation, citizenship or veteran status. It follows the Fundamental Principles of the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement. The Red Cross is closely integrated into community preparedness, response, and recovery efforts, including those of federal, tribal, state and local government and other nongovernmental organizations. Our goal is to work with multi-sector partners to help individuals, families, and communities prepare for, respond to, and recover from natural and manmade disasters of all sizes.

The Red Cross provides disaster cycle services pursuant to its Bylaws and other internal policies and procedures as well as its Congressional Charter (USC 36 §300101-300111). In the Charter, Congress authorized the Red Cross "to carry out a system of national and international relief in time of peace, and apply that system in mitigating the suffering caused by pestilence, famine, fire, floods, and other great national calamities, and to devise and carry out measures for preventing those calamities."

#### a. Preparedness

The Red Cross vision for preparedness is that we, together with community leaders, partners and other stakeholders have built community capacity and capability to survive, to minimize suffering and to recover quickly after a disaster or emergency; and that together we have made preparedness a cultural norm all across the nation. The components for achieving this vision include:

- Assessing community hazards, priority risks, needs and asset;
- Engaging the community in preparedness (e.g. Home Fire Campaign);
- Enabling individuals and families and organizations to take preparedness actions;
- Leveraging our national network of volunteers and our ability to engage partners in direct preparedness actions within communities nationwide;
- Working with social service organizations and schools to help them, their clients and students survive and recover quickly from a disaster;
- Reinforcing preparedness for people and organizations who have taken preparedness actions.

#### b. Response

The Red Cross vision for response is to alleviate human suffering in the face of emergencies by mobilizing and organizing community resources to meet the immediate life-sustaining needs of individuals, families and communities affected by disaster; to lay the groundwork for long-term recovery; and to build resilience for future events.

The range of services necessary to achieve this vision will vary based on the needs of those affected and the scale of the disaster. Additionally, there is often overlap between the provision of response and recovery services. The blending of the two processes is necessary for seamless service to individuals, families and communities. Response services most commonly include, but not limited too:

- Home Fire Response Services
- Sheltering
- Feeding
- Health Services
- Mental Health Services
- Spiritual Care Services
- Reunification
- Distribution of Relief Supplies
- Information & Referrals

#### c. Recovery

The Red Cross vision for recovery is to provide a standard and scalable set of services that align with available resources to bridge the gaps between client resources and serious human needs and that result in a similar set of assistance for similarly situated clients. Recovery services most commonly include:

- Community Recovery Strategy Development
- Damage Assessment
- · Casework/Recovery Planning
- Direct Client Assistance
- Community Preparedness & Resiliency Building

#### d. Mitigation

The Red Cross, working with government and partner agencies, will identify areas where mitigation activities are appropriate and fit within the mission of the Red Cross.

#### 2. Services related to the National Response Framework

The Red Cross is a co-lead for the mass care component of Emergency Support Function (ESF)

<sup>\*</sup>For large and/or complex recovery operations, where significant donor resources are available, expanded services or assistance may be provided.

#6 of the National Response Framework (NRF). In this role, the Red Cross engages in a variety of activities to support states in their planning, coordinating and executing of mass care programs and strategies. The Red Cross also takes a leadership role in working with other non-governmental organizations and private companies that provide services during a disaster. Additionally, the Red Cross is a support agency to other ESFs – including ESF-8 and ESF-15 – in the NRF.

#### 3. Services related to the National Recovery Framework

The Red Cross is among the supporting organizations for three Recovery Support Functions: Community Planning and Capacity Building; Health and Social Services; and, Housing. In these roles, the Red Cross engages at the headquarters level, as well as at the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) regional level, to provide insight and assistance in planning by drawing on Red Cross experience and representing the perspective of non-governmental organizations and private entities that provide recovery services.

#### 4. Organization

The Red Cross is chartered by the United States Congress to provide humanitarian services. Its national headquarters, located in Washington, D.C., is responsible for implementing policies and procedures that govern Red Cross activities and provides administrative and technical oversight and guidance to its regions and divisions. Each region has certain authority and responsibility for carrying out Red Cross disaster preparedness, response and recovery activities, delivering local Red Cross services, and meeting corporate obligations within the territorial jurisdiction assigned to it. Each region is familiar with the hazards of the locality and surveys local resources for personnel, equipment, supplies, transportation, emergency communications, and facilities available for disaster relief. Regions also formulate cooperative plans and procedures with local government agencies and private organizations for relief activities should a disaster occur.

Through its nationwide network, the Red Cross coordinates its total resources for use in large disasters. In order to provide these services, the Red Cross will work with federal, tribal, state and/or local government for assistance and collaboration.

#### **III. Cooperative Actions**

The Red Cross recognizes the authority assigned to city and village mayors, town supervisors, county executive, and other local county officials of Broome County and will share operating plans, priorities and objectives with the delegated emergency management staff of the local jurisdiction. The Red Cross recognizes the Broome County Office of Emergency Services as the coordinating agency during times of disaster.

Broome County recognizes the national level roles and responsibilities designated to the Red Cross in the October 22, 2010 Memorandum of Agreement between FEMA and Red Cross.

Broome County recognizes the Red Cross as having mass care responsibility in domestic disasters and when activated, authorizes and will support and coordinate with the Red Cross in the execution of these duties.

The Red Cross and the Broome County Office of Emergency Services will coordinate their respective disaster cycle activities to maximize services to the community and avoid duplication of efforts in the following ways:

Every effort will be made by the Red Cross to assist Broome County in building out local shelter capacity. Based on the scale and scope of a disaster, both parties understand and agree; operations may need to scale up to a Regional response. The Red Cross will work with jurisdictions to conduct training for staff (CERT, municipal employees, etc...) to develop local capacity to support shelter operations.

- 1. Explore ways to align business and operational processes and programs across the disaster cycle in an effort to make a more seamless disaster preparedness, response, and recovery experience for residents of Broome County.
- 2. Coordinate mutual activation of no-notice events through the established 24 hour notification point of contact and develop joint Standard Operating Procedures for ongoing communications, including use of electronic technology, radio communications, and other emergency coordination protocols.
- 3. Maintain close coordination, liaison activities, and support at all levels with conferences, meetings, and other means of communication. Include a representative of the other party in appropriate committees, planning groups and task forces formed to mitigate, prepare for, respond to, and recover from disasters and other emergencies.
- 4. During a disaster or emergency situation, the Red Cross will, at the request of the Broome County Office of Emergency Services, provide liaison personnel to the Broome County Office of Emergency Services Emergency Operations Center. The Broome County Office of Emergency Services will provide facility access and identification, work space, and, whenever possible, other required support, such as a computer, e-mail access and a designated phone line for the Red Cross liaison personnel assigned to the Emergency Operations Center.
- 5. The Broome County Office of Emergency Services will support the Red Cross in the use of the National Shelter System (NSS) and the Red Cross will coordinate shelter information sharing and reporting with the Broome County Office of Emergency Services.
- 6. The Broome County Office of Emergency Services will facilitate the Red Cross use of facilities for shelters and service delivery sites wherever possible. The terms and conditions of such use will be set forth in a separate agreement.
- 7. During disasters and emergencies, keep each other informed of the human needs created

by the events and the services they are providing. Share current data regarding disasters, to include risk and hazard analysis, statistical information, social media verifications, historical information, emerging needs and trends, damage assessments, declarations, and service delivery plans.

- 8. Broome County and the Red Cross will coordinate data on all phases of emergency management activities in an effort to increase efficiency of response and reduce duplication of resources. This includes data on damage assessments, shelter populations, feeding operations, etc.
- 9. Broome County Office of Emergency Services and the Red Cross will work together to develop plans for using catering and/or concessions capabilities and services to support mobile or fixed feeding operations in connection with a disaster response.
- 10. Both Brome County and the Red Cross recognize the importance providing services to those with access and functional needs. Both organizations will work together to develop plans, revise planning annexes, and identify resources to facilitate delivery of services to people with disabilities or other access and functional needs during a disaster.
- 11. Actively participate in reviewing and carrying out responsibilities outlined in the Broome County Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan.
- 12. Both parties will ensure, to the fullest extent possible, that disaster operations within Broome County will be as accessible as possible to people with disabilities or other access and functional needs, based on the American with Disabilities Act and related federal, state and local laws, including, but not limited too, ADA compliant communications techniques.
- 13. Prior to and during the time of disaster, keep the public informed of cooperative efforts through the public information offices of the Red Cross and the Broome County Office of Emergency Services and explore opportunities for collaboration to provide community, family, and citizen disaster preparedness within Broome County.
- 14. The Broome County Office of Emergency Services recognizes that the Red Cross is dependent upon voluntary public financial donations. In accordance with applicable laws and regulations, the Broome County Office of Emergency Services will support the Red Cross in locating and acquiring necessary resources in an emergency including a response to formal resource requests. Both parties will work together, as appropriate, to identify local sourcing solutions that expand disaster capabilities and enhance community resilience.
- 15. Both parties agree not to use or display any trademarks of the other without first receiving the express written permission to do so; however, the use of the trademarks of the other party is permitted for internal meeting notes and plans that are not publicly distributed and used during the normal course of business related to the purpose of the MOU. If either party desires to use the intellectual property of the other, the "requesting

- party" should submit the proposed promotional/marketing materials, press releases, website displays or otherwise proposed use of the trademarks to the "owning party" for review in advance of dissemination or publication.
- 16. Staff and volunteers from municipalities and the Red Cross will routinely work side-byside during disaster responses in support of the overall mission to provide relief to those
  affected. In some instances, Red Cross trained municipal employees may wish to respond
  as Red Cross volunteers during a disaster. When doing so, trained municipal employees
  must get prior approval from Municipality management so that no conflict of interest
  exists. If approved, the municipal employee, functioning as a Red Cross volunteer will be
  subject to Red Cross policies and procedures, and be under the direct supervision and
  control of the Red Cross during the disaster response.
- 17. The Red Cross will support Broome County in integrating the efforts of the non-governmental organizations (NGOs) and Broome County Community Organizations Active in Disasters (COAD) that provide mass care services (e.g. Mass Care Feeding Task Forces) during disaster response operations.
- 18. Make training, educational and other developmental opportunities available to the other party's personnel and explore joint training and exercises. Encourage all staff and volunteers to engage in training (e.g. ICS 100 and 200), exercises, and disaster response activities, as appropriate.
- 19. Widely distribute this MOU within the Red Cross and the Broome County Office of Emergency Services departments and administrative offices and urge full cooperation.
- 20. During shelter operations the following is recognized:
  - a. County Animal Response Team will coordinate the sheltering of non-service animals.
  - b. Broome County Security Division will provide site security at all Broome County shelters.
  - c. Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service will provide an alternate method of communication between the county emergency operations center and a shelter. The Red Cross will coordinate with the onsite RACES staff to accommodate space and location needs.
  - d. The Broome County Health Department will coordinate medical sheltering.
  - e. The Broome County Department of Social Services will assist with case management and other applicable services of those in shelters.
- 21. The Red Cross will communicate with the Office of Emergency Services any community emergencies that do not fit in the Red Cross purview as soon as possible.
- 22. During recovery operations the Red Cross will participate in the client case management process coordinated by the Broome County Department of Social Services.

#### IV. Periodic Review

The parties will, on an annual basis, on or around the anniversary date of this MOU, jointly evaluate their progress in implementing this MOU and revise and develop new plans, attachments or goals as appropriate. Both parties should notify the other if primary points of contact change.

#### V. Term and Termination.

This MOU is effective as of \_\_\_\_\_\_\_. It expires on \_\_\_\_\_\_\_. Six months prior to expiration, the parties will meet to review the progress and success of the cooperative effort. In connection with such review, the parties may decide to extend this MOU for an additional period not exceeding five years, and if so shall confirm this in a signed writing. This MOU may be terminated by written notification from either party to the other at any time and for any or no reason.

#### VI. Miscellaneous

This MOU does not create a partnership, a joint power agreement, or a joint venture and does not create any financial commitments from one party to the other. Neither party has the authority to bind the other to any obligation. It is not intended that this MOU be enforceable as a matter of law in any court or dispute resolution forum. The sole remedy for non-performance under this MOU shall be termination, with no damages or penalty.






