


Agricultural Districts

9,162,250 Acres 26,246 Farms 154 Districts 53 Counties



Notify Town!- Local Zoning- Area/Use Variances- Special Use Permit- Fees...

Towns can develop a streamlined application process for Farm Operation enrolled in an Ag District Caveat: If Towns can show that public health or safety is threatened, local law stands.



Key Elements of an Ag Protection Plan

Vision for Agriculture: Local perspective to help frame land use/zoning


SWOT Analysis: Strength, Weakness, Opportunities, Threats (derived from robust public participation process)

Farm Friendly Analysis: Do your laws accommodate agricultural pursuits?

Priority Farmlands Map: Prime soils, lands in production, Ag Assessed parcels, Ag Districts, proximity analysis (infrastructure/buffers/conserved lands)

Prioritized Recommendations: Ag Economic Development/ Ag Protection

Planning For Agriculture (aka: Smart Growth!)

- Does your comprehensive plan support the long-term viability of your farm community?
 - Goals and Objectives;
 - Identifies lands to protect for agricultural production on future land use map;
 - Proposes policies and programs to support agriculture.
- Is there an adopted agriculture & farmland protection plan in place?







Zoning

- Crude but can be relatively effective in protecting land resource;
- Needs to reflect reality of modern agriculture;
- Must not infringe on ability to farm;

Architecture Art Planning

Economic viability of agriculture critical.
 Cornell AAP

3 Questions

- Does your zoning protect agricultural lands by channeling development away from actively farmed areas?
- Does your zoning unreasonably restrict farm operations?
- Does your zoning provide your farmers the flexibility they need to successfully compete economically?





- Does your local government support/ encourage farmers to take advantage of the NYS Agricultural Districts program?
- Does your local government support/ encourage farmers to participate in purchase of development rights programs?







Zoning Definitions

- Are they clear?
- Are they concise?
- Are they comprehensive?



Zoning Definitions

- Be comprehensive in your definitions section;
- Have a definition for any term/word that has specific meaning in the context of your zoning code.







Zoning Definitions

- Make sure each definition is clear as to what you mean;
- Let Webster's take care of commonly utilized words, with generally accepted meanings;



Is your definition of agriculture up-to-date & comprehensive?

"The use of land and on-farm buildings, equipment, manure processing and handling facilities, and practices which contribute to the production, preparation and marketing of crops, animal husbandry, livestock and livestock products as a commercial enterprise, including a commercial horse-boarding operation as defined in the Agriculture and Markets Law, Article 25-AA, § 301, and timber processing as defined in this Zoning Law."

<u>Town of Geneva NY Zoning Code</u>

- Agriculture;
- Agricultural tourism;
- Agricultural commerce;
- Commercial horse boarding vs. personal stable;
- Farm timber operation;
- Home occupation;
- Sign.





Definitions

- Farm brewery vs. brewery?
- Farm cidery vs. cidery?
- Farm distillery vs. distillery?
- Farm winery vs winery?

"...as part of and subordinate to an active farm operation..."





Permitted Uses

- Agricultural tourism;
- Agricultural commerce;
- Alternative / renewable energy systems;
- Farm timber operations;
- Commercial horse boarding operations;
- Concentrated Animal Feed Operations;
- Manure storage & handling facilities.





Non-Commercial Farm

- Potential large economic benefits for farmers;
- Cut energy costs;
- Generate revenues;
- Recycle wastes.

Non-Commercial Wind

- Permitted use;
- Scaled to fit farm operation;
- Reasonable setbacks, height limitations;
- Avoid high quality soils.
- Commercial systems



Commercial Systems

- Wind generally compatible;
- Relatively small footprint;
- Access road design important;
- Soil/site restoration provisions;
- Decommissioning provisions.





Commercial Systems

- Commercial solar not so compatible;
 - Permanence of systems;
 - Acreage requirements;
- Access road design important;
- Soil/site restoration provisions;
- Decommissioning provisions.





Zoning Protections


- Setback requirements;
- Direct away from prime soils & farmland of statewide importance;
- Landscaping & screening standards;
- Decommissioning provisions;
- Surety posting.
