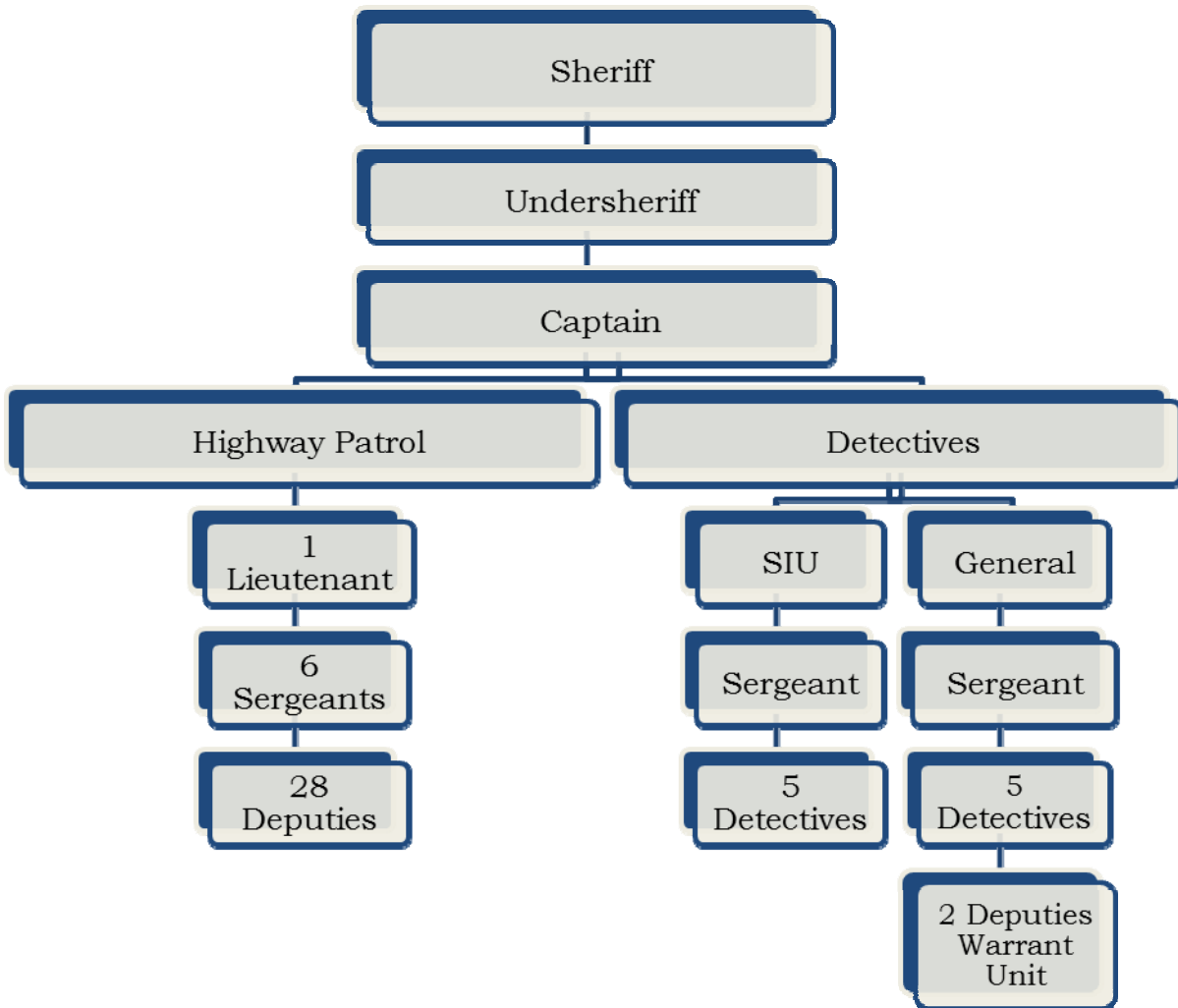
# HIGHWAY PATROL DIVISION



The Broome County Sheriff's Office Patrol Division is comprised of highly trained members who are prepared to respond to any incident that happens in any of the sixteen towns, seven villages or the City of Binghamton, which comprise Broome County. The Broome County Sheriff's Office Patrol Division is the primary Law Enforcement agency for 49.5 % of the residents in Broome County. The Patrol Division serves the residents of Broome County as they attend school, go to work and shop outside the city and village limits within the County. The Patrol Division also provides law enforcement services to the other six municipal police agencies within the County and answers calls for service in their respective jurisdiction when the need arises. The Patrol Division enforces the laws of the State of New York and does so while proactively patrolling 1008 miles of state highways, 350 miles of County roadways and 927 miles of town roads on a twenty four hour a day, seven day a week basis. The Patrol Division is also equipped to handle specialized calls for service by deploying the Marine Unit, the Motor Unit, the K-9 unit and the SWAT Special Weapons and Tactic Team when the need arises.



# Broome County Sheriff's Office Law Enforcement Chain Of Command





The Broome County Sheriff's Office Patrol Division maintains a fleet of 20 patrol vehicles to include 13-Chevrolet Tahoe's and 4-Ford Crown Victoria's and 3- Chevrolet Caprice's.

During the year 2013 the Patrol Division handled 20,477 calls for service which was an increase from the 2012 total of 20,438. An additional 8,448 quick call complaints which are generated by the deputies while they were working in their respective patrol zones. A Deputy will generate a "quick call" when he or she exits their patrol vehicle for a self-initiated investigation or when he or she conducts a vehicle stop. A quick call may or may not generate an actual incident or a call for service. The following pages set forth a breakdown of these calls for service and the arrests made by the deputies.

The following graph represents calls for service based on the day of the week:



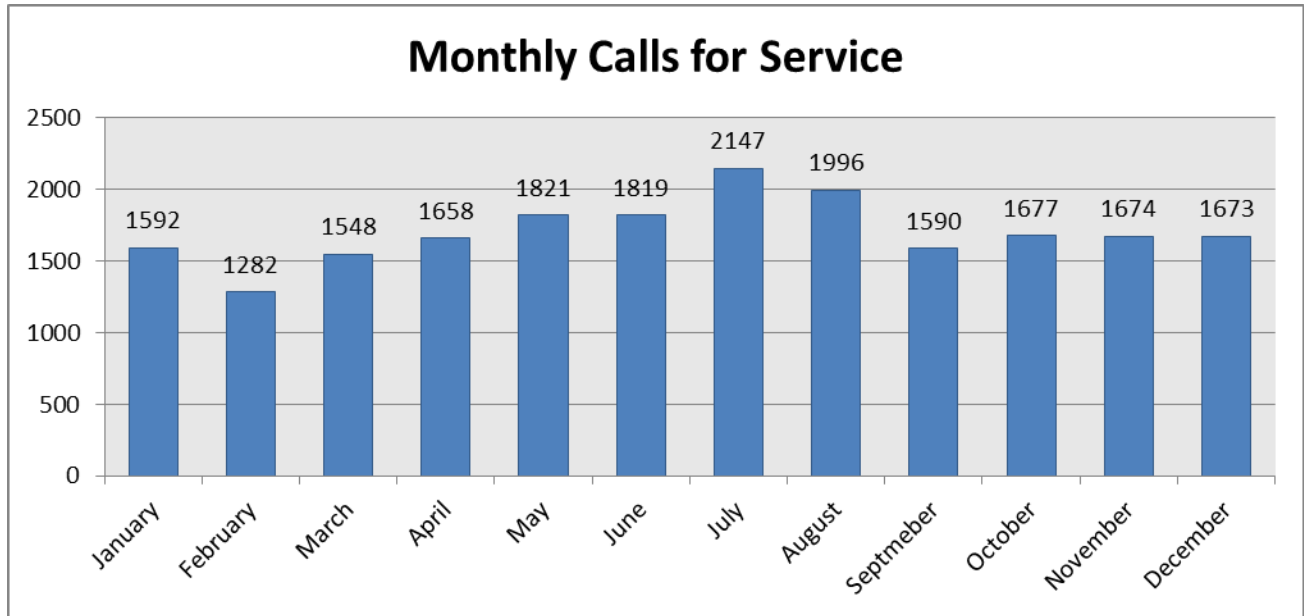
## Calls for Service- By Shift

## *Calls for Service- By month*

The following graph represents the total number of calls for service by months that were handled by members of the Highway Patrol Division. As is generally the case, the late spring and summer months are the busiest time of the year.



## *Prioritizing Calls for Service*

Calls for police service vary in the type of response that is dictated. Some calls are of an extreme emergency in nature, while others can be handled by the officer sometime during their tour of duty. Still others require prompt attention, but do not meet the criteria for an emergency response.

1. **EMERGENCY CALLS** generally mean the type of call that requires immediate response due to personal injury, substantial public inconvenience or the fact that another person has been placed in jeopardy of serious physical injury and, which is likely to occur if police assistance is delayed in any manner.
2. **ROUTINE CALLS** generally mean those calls which have little or no chance for personal injury or harm to any person or little potential for causing substantial public inconvenience.

Emergency calls will be classified as "PRIORITY ONE" calls.

Examples of “PRIORITY ONE” calls might include:

1. A personal injury auto accident.
2. Any call in which there is a risk of death or serious physical injury.
3. A heated domestic violence case where weapons are involved.

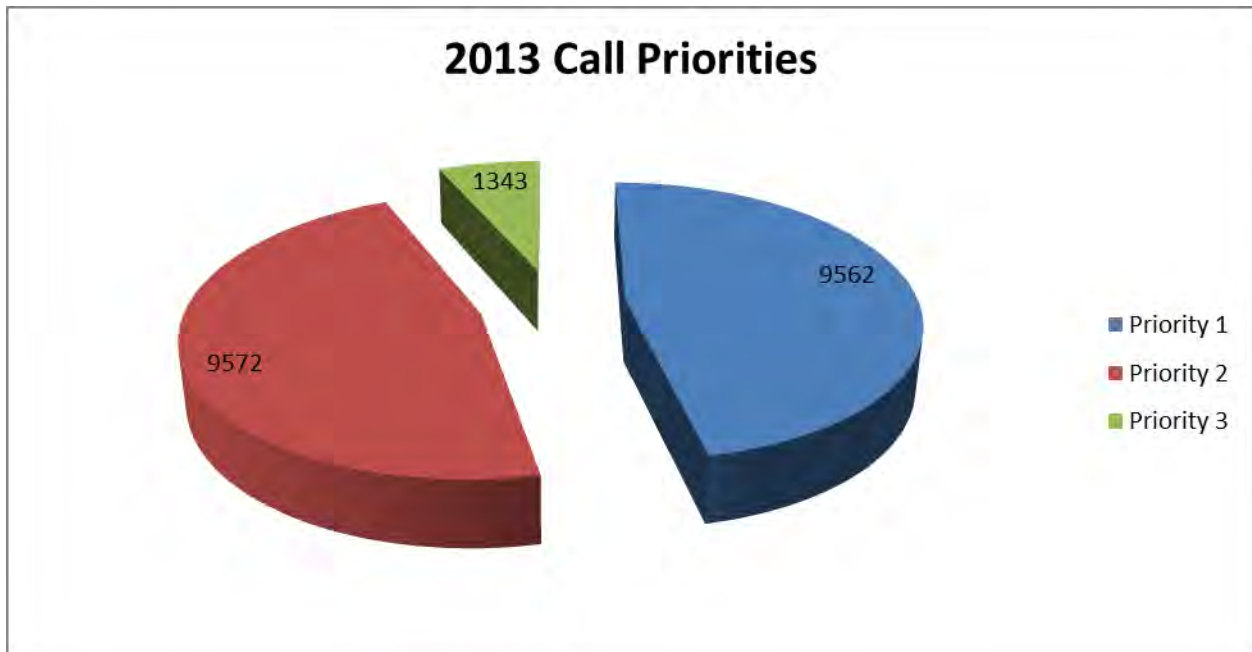
Routine calls will be classified as “PRIORITY TWO” calls.

Examples of “PRIORITY TWO” calls might include:

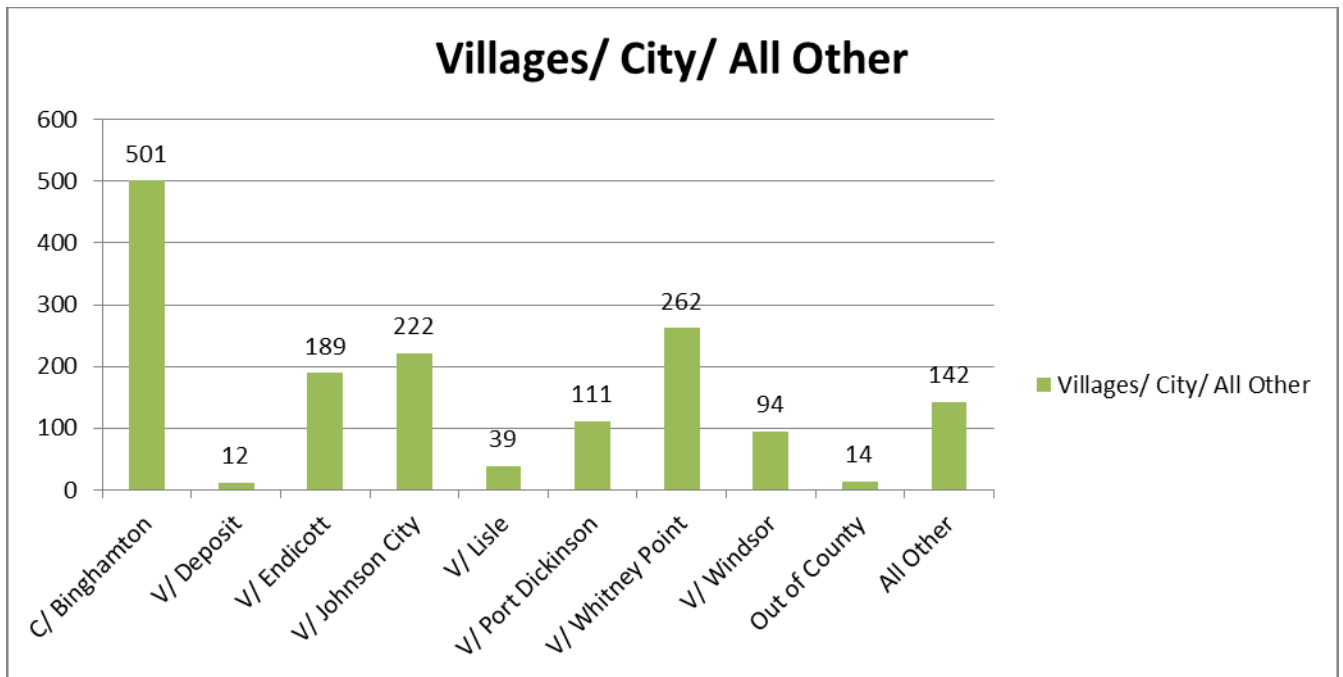
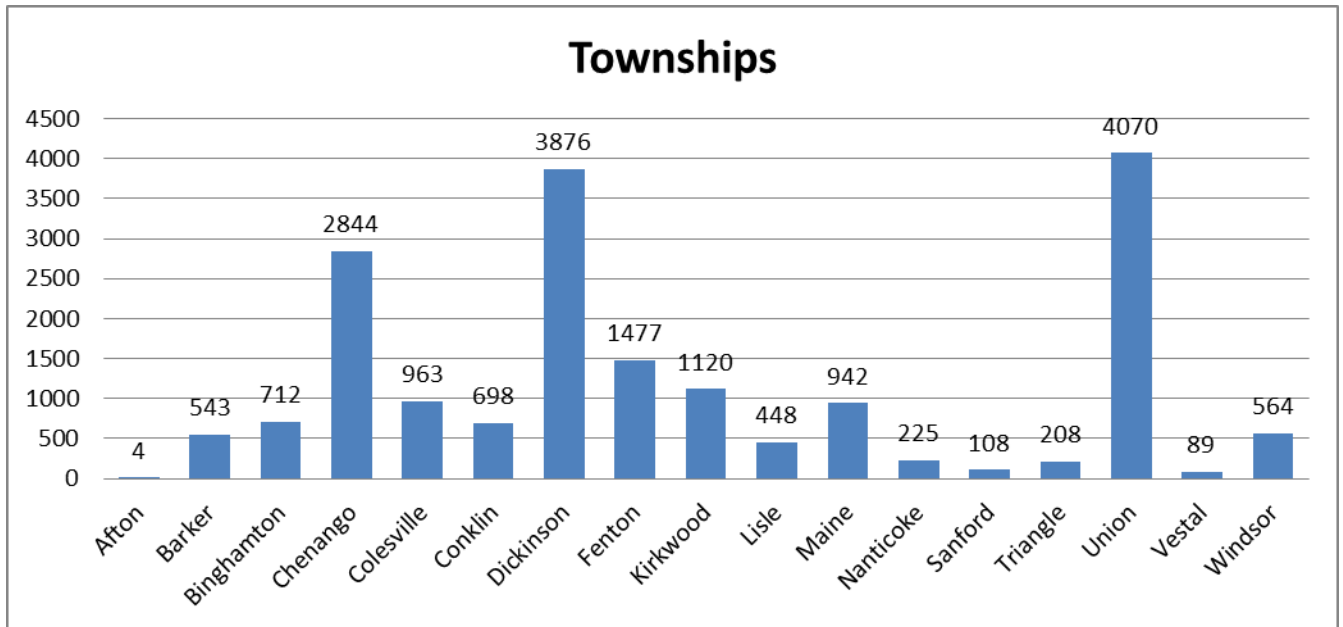
1. Motor vehicle accidents without injury

Examples of “PRIORITY THREE” calls might include:

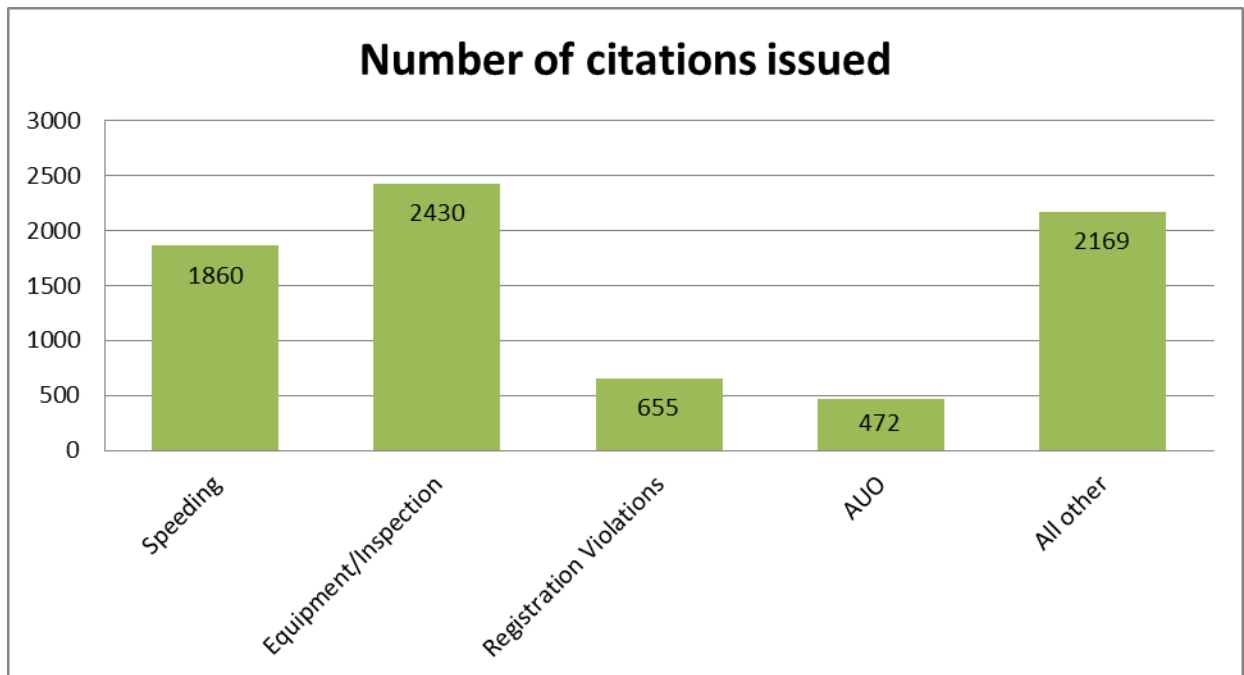
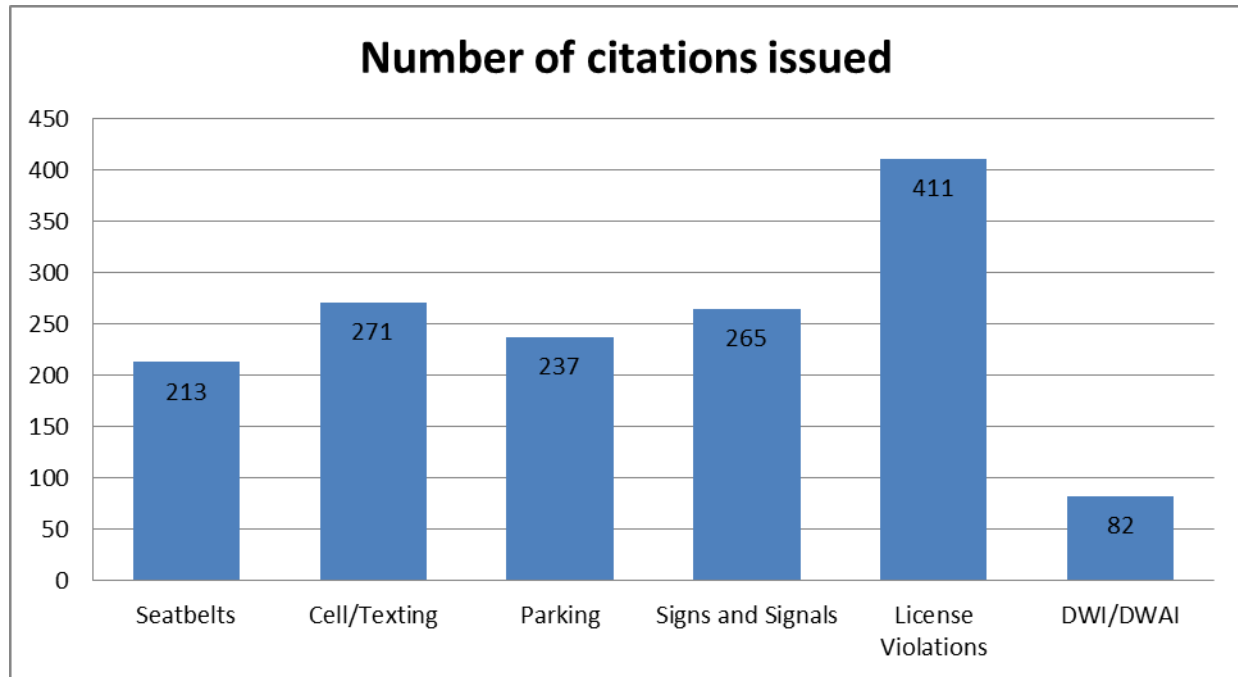
1. Calls for which an officer has a prior commitment such as an escort.

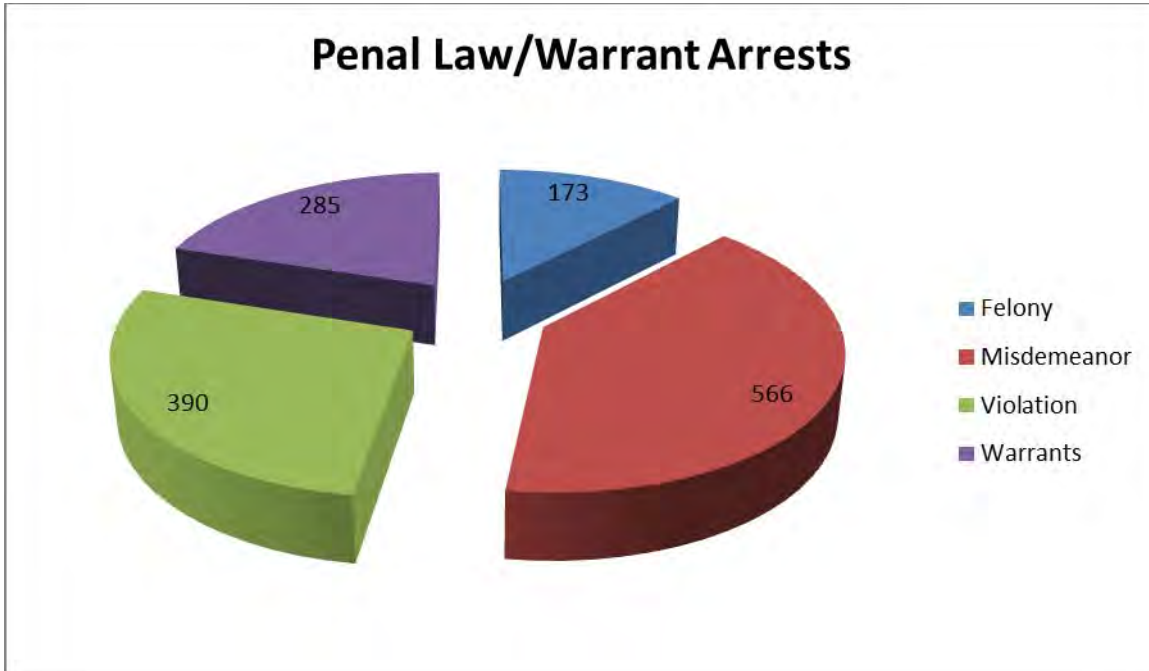

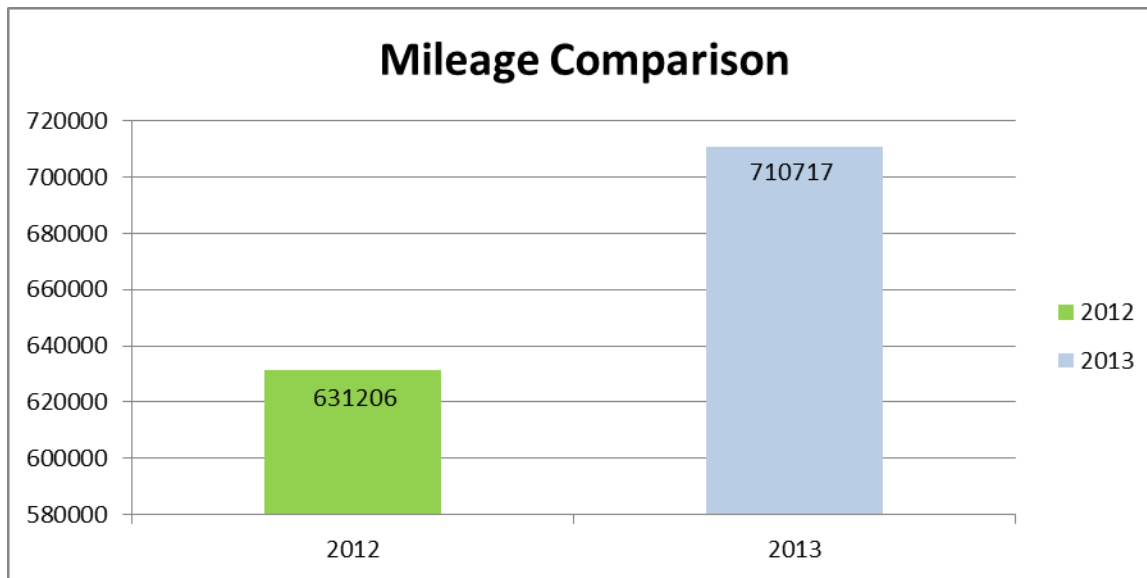


# *Broome County Sheriff's Office Fleet*

## **Stop DWI Enforcement**

During 2013 members of the Broome County Sheriff's Office remained committed to keeping the roadways safe and absent of motorists who chose to drink and drive. The Sheriff's Office continued to build on the successes of 2012 and once again partnered with other police agencies throughout Broome County to address Driving while Drugged/Intoxicated issues. The Broome County STOP-DWI program continued to secure funding to make these multi-agency and multi-jurisdictional operations a possibility. During 2013, our Office also participated in several educational initiatives in the school system. During prom and graduation seasons, deputies were in the schools administering Breathalyzer tests and educating the students on the inherent dangers of driving while under the influence of drugs and alcohol. Members of the Sheriff's Office worked a total of 315 man hours in support of this cause, during those hours, 82 DWI arrests were made and a total of 112 traffic tickets were issued. Looking forward, the Sheriff's Office will remain committed to addressing this issue and continue to work with other police agencies to keep the roadways of Broome County safe.



# Prescription Medication Drop-off Program

The Sheriff's Office participates in a prescription medication drop-off program where citizens can drop off old, unwanted or expired medications safely and anonymously in an effort to keep them off the streets. The Sheriff's Office provides a drop box in the lobby of the administration building where medications can be dropped off any week day during normal business hours. In 2013, the Sheriff's Office took in about 1171 lbs. of unwanted prescription and over the counter medications. This was a sharp increase from only 130 lbs. in 2012.

In addition, the Sheriff's Office also participates in the National take-back initiatives sponsored by the Office of Diversion Control run by the Drug Enforcement Administration and U. S. Department of Justice. During the initiatives, the Sheriff's Office mans several publicized drop-off locations throughout the County where citizens drop off their old, unwanted or expired medications. At the conclusion of the initiative, the Sheriff's Office turns collected medications over to a representative from the D.E.A. During 2013, one such initiative was conducted.



## *Individual Trauma Kits*

In 2012 the Broome County Sheriff's Office embarked on a project to deploy trauma kits in each of the police vehicles in its fleet. Building on the success of that project last year, the Broome County Sheriff's Office partnered with New York State DCJS in 2013 and took possession of 55 individual trauma kits. These lifesaving kits, that are now worn on the deputy's person, and contain a tourniquet and quick-clot that will provide immediate care for the deputy or someone else should they receive a traumatic injury.



# CANINE UNIT

The Canine unit is comprised of three teams, consisting of two Dutch Shepherds and one German Shepherd, each of which is assigned to a trained and certified Deputy Sheriff canine handler. All three canines are trained in police patrol, which includes certifications in area searches, building searches, tracking and suspect apprehension. In addition, each canine is further trained to specialize in either narcotics detection or explosive scent detection. The Sheriff's Office currently has two narcotic detection canines and one explosive scent detection canine. The canine teams train eight (8) hours every other week for a total of 26 training days per year.

## **The canine teams are as follows:**



Deputy Richard Merrell and Canine Ruger

Deputy Merrell has been employed with the Sheriff's Office for 7 years and a canine handler for 5. Canine Ruger is a 6 year old male Dutch Shepherd who is trained in narcotics detection. Deputy Merrell and Canine Ruger are a part of the Broome-Endicott SWAT team and participate in additional training with the SWAT team several times per year. In April 2013, Deputy Merrell and canine Ruger successfully tracked and located a suspect in the Village of Endicott who was wanted on an active NYS felony parole warrant.



Deputy Leon Brown and Canine Aear

Deputy Brown has been with the Sheriff's Office for 7 years and a canine handler for 5. Canine Aear is a 6 year old male Dutch Shepherd who is specially trained in explosive scent detection. Deputy Brown and Canine Aear were called upon several times throughout the year to conduct searches for explosive scent detection. The Cortland County Sheriff's Office requested their assistance with a bomb threat at a grocery store in Cortland. The Chenango Forks school administration requested their assistance with a search of the high school after a break-in and the Binghamton Police Department requested their assistance searching a crime scene for a recently-



fired handgun. Furthermore, they were deployed to Cornell University for two days in May, 2013 for bomb searches prior to commencement ceremonies. Canine Aevar also successfully tracked two suspects to a residence in the Village of Endicott after a report of a burglary in April, 2013.



Deputy Willard Andres and Canine Mac

Deputy Andres has been employed with the Sheriff's Office for 7 years and has been a canine handler for 2 ½. Canine Mac is a 3 ½ year old male German Shepherd who is trained in narcotics detection. Deputy Andres and Canine Mac participate in all requests for canine demonstrations in the community due to Canine Mac's friendly disposition and gentle demeanor. In 2013, as a team, they were involved in twelve (12) demonstrations and about twenty (20) community events. Canine Mac's strongest skill sets are tracking, narcotics detection and his approachable, mild temperament which lends well to community interaction. In September, 2013, Deputy Andres and canine Mac successfully located a subject hiding from police in a wooded area at night. The subject, who was apprehended without incident, was wanted on an active NYS parole warrant.



## *Honor Guard*



The Broome County Sheriff's Office Honor Guard detail is led by one Sergeant and a few select hand-picked Deputies. The Honor Guard's primary duties include funeral honors for fallen and retired officers and to serve as Guardians of the Colors by displaying and escorting the National Flag during ceremonial events.

Events attended by the Sheriff's Office Honor Guard include National Police Week ceremonies, 9/11 remembrances and the annual Crime Victim's tribute. The Honor Guard also participates in several parades each year, most notably the annual St. Patrick's Day parade in Binghamton. The uniform worn by the Honor Guard is the "class A" formal dress blouse with a gold shoulder cord and Sam Browne shoulder rig with attached duty belt, trousers, shined shoes and the Stetson hat.

# *Marine Patrol Unit*

The Marine Unit is comprised of three Sergeants and eleven deputies who are responsible for the enforcement of boating safety regulations as well as conducting search, rescue, and recovery operations. Deputies assigned to the Marine Unit are also responsible for the verification of Hull Identification Number for registration purposes.

The unit utilizes three boats to patrol the waterways of Broome County. The primary boat is a 16 foot Rivercraft Airboat. The Marine Patrol also has a 14 foot quicksilver inflatable rescue boat powered by a 25 horsepower Mercury engine and a 14 foot Grumman aluminum boat powered by a 25 horsepower Evinrude engine. The Marine Patrol is also equipped with an underwater video camera and a Global Positioning System, as well as state of the art wet suits. On June 17, 2013, the Marine Unit conducted training maneuvers on the Chenango River in Nineveh.

On August 18, 2013, the Marine Patrol Unit provided safety and security at the annual Broome County Triathlon at Dorchester Park.



# Broome County Sheriff Motorcycle Unit

The Motor Unit is equipped with two Harley Davidson Police Motorcycles. One is a 2000 model FLHPI 88 Police Road King, designated as MC1. The second is a 2007 FLHPI 95 Police Road King designated as MC2. Both MC1 and MC2 are in serviceable condition at this time. Additionally, we can transport one or both motors in our 9x12 enclosed transport trailer. MC1 is equipped with a portable STALKER handheld radar unit that can be used for stationary speed enforcement. Both Units are equipped with a hard-mounted STALKER DUAL radar unit that can be utilized for both stationary and moving radar with both a front and rear antennae.

The Motor Unit was relegated to an array of assignments for the 2013 riding season, and was utilized for parade and special details, as well as community oriented policing functions. The Motor Unit was able to increase our level of participation in these types of events by more than 25% in 2013. Events we participated in included:

# *BROOME-ENDICOTT SWAT TEAM*

The Broome-Endicott SWAT Team is a multi-jurisdictional SWAT Team comprised of Deputies from the Broome County Sheriff's Office and Officers from the Endicott Police Department. The integrated team also consists of four (4) Tactical Emergency Medical Support (TEMS) Paramedics specifically assigned to SWAT operations, Deputy Rich Merrell with K9 Ruger works jointly with the Endicott Bomb Squad.

## Broome-Endicott SWAT Team



The SWAT team was utilized in a variety of situations and circumstances in 2013:

- Security for President Obama's visit to Broome County
- Multiple arrest/search warrant executions

Team members receive over 184 hours of specialized training every year in multiple disciplines and certifications. The team utilizes a CASSPIR armored vehicle to deploy in high risk incidents safely.

# Special Investigations Unit





## Mission:

The *Broome County Special Investigations Unit Task Force* is a multi-jurisdictional task force primarily committed to the suppression of illegal and illicit drugs within Broome County. The Task Force actively pursues those individuals or groups who manufacture, distribute or sell illegal drugs within the jurisdictional boundaries of Broome County. In addition, the Task Force focuses on enforcing laws related to illegal firearms, prostitution, and Alcoholic Beverage Control Laws of the State of New York. The Task Force also conducts special operations including, but not limited to, homicides, extortion, robbery, larcenies, and counterfeit cases.

The Broome County Special Investigations Unit Task Force is comprised of law enforcement officers from the Broome County Sheriff's Office, City of Binghamton Police Department, and Village of Johnson City Police Department. The Broome County Sheriff's Office has a Detective Sergeant and five Detectives assigned to the Task Force; City of Binghamton Police Department has a Sergeant and four Investigators assigned to the Task Force; and the Village of Johnson City Police Department has one Detective assigned to the Task Force. The total number of members assigned to the Task Force at the end of 2013 is 12. The Task Force also works closely with other local, state and federal law enforcement agencies. The mission of the Task Force is accomplished through the combined and coordinated enforcement efforts among the various law enforcement agencies working within or directly with the Task Force.

The Task Force accomplishes its mission by utilizing the following investigative techniques:

- Surveillance
- Confidential Sources
- Search Warrants
- Eavesdropping Warrants
- Undercover Operations
- Patrol stops
- Stings/Coordinated Investigations

## Analysis of 2013 Goals & Objectives:

At the beginning of 2013, members of the Task Force established three new goals to achieve during the year.

**Goal #1: The Task Force will increase efforts to suppress underage drinking in bars, with a renewed focus on bars operating in outlying areas of Broome County.**

This goal was met with bifurcated success - the Task Force initiated coordinated investigations/stings which resulted in underage arrests in ABC establishments outside the City of Binghamton.

The initiative for this goal was created in furtherance of 2012's successful enforcement efforts which focused primarily on ABC establishments within City of Binghamton limits. For 2013,

the Task Force refocused its goal on ABC enforcement *outside* the city limits as well, targeting bars in the outlying areas of Broome County.

The objective of this type of enforcement was to suppress underage drinking where routine police enforcement/contact was less frequent.

The Task Force conducted 8 separate raids/stings resulting in 4 ABC arrests.

The Task Force conducted other ABC investigations not limited to bar raids. The Task Force initiated a new detail county-wide entitled “Shoulder Tap.” This initiative was the result of recent studies in which youth have reported that adults aged 21 and older are their most common source of alcohol. During this operation, a minor (under the age of 21) worked under the direct supervision of law enforcement. At law enforcement direction, the minor would solicit adults outside a convenience store to buy alcohol for the minor. The Task Force utilized underage decoys for this detail. Nine locations were targeted in a six hour period, with 3 total arrested, each charged with ABC Law- Prohibited Sales.

**Goal #2: Task Force supervisors will increase efforts to arrange additional trainings throughout 2013. The purpose of such trainings would be to increase the abilities and overall skill level of Task Force Investigators in the areas of tactical competency as well as legally sufficient investigative methods.**

This goal was met. During 2013, Task Force supervisors coordinated and facilitated several trainings, many of which were met with success and high praise. Various tactical trainings were held at the Task Force main office and others were held out of town. Additionally, those Task Force members who are also SWAT Officers, were able to provide monthly tactical training to all Task Force members; a service very beneficial to all members.

Some of the trainings included: New York Tactical Officers Association (NYTOA) tactical high-risk warrant service, search warrant drafting, marijuana grow operation, gang-affiliation recognition, eavesdropping wire preparation, and Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations (RICO) organized crime investigations.

These trainings increased the overall skill level, investigative abilities, and tactical competency of all members involved. Each officer was granted a certification for successfully passing these courses.

**Goal #3: The Task Force will work to upgrade its existing vehicle surveillance platform to the Digital and Internet Video Age.**

The goal of upgrading of vehicle surveillance was not met due to insufficient grant availability.

## **2014 Goals & Objectives:**

- The Task Force will look for a new facility to house the multijurisdictional unit, keeping the Task Force intact.
- Task Force supervisors will continue to concentrate efforts to arrange training throughout 2014. The purpose of such trainings would be to familiarize new Investigators with unit specific training as well as to increase the abilities and overall skill level of existing Task Force Investigators.
- The Task Force will continue efforts to identify and suppress gang activity in neighborhoods and in commercial locations. Individuals who practice gang activity by engaging in trafficking of illegal drugs and violent crimes will be identified and targeted.
- The Task Force will work to equip all undercover vehicles regularly assigned to Investigators with functional emergency lights and sirens. This will increase visibility and overall safety of the Investigators and general public when circumstances dictate emergency operation of such vehicles.

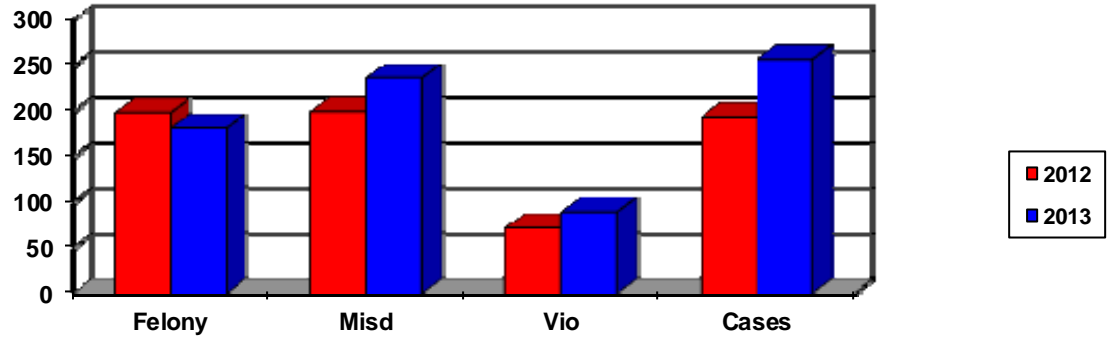

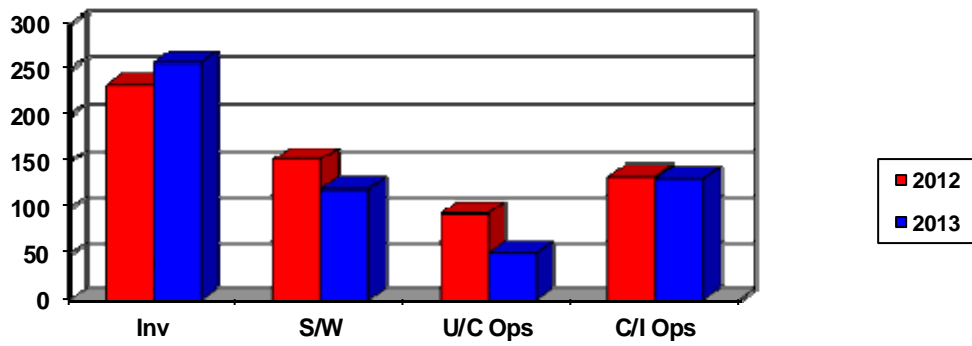

## **Notable Cases**

### **Traffic Stop of gang member yields crack-cocaine, 3 guns and cash.**

The Task Force received information that a man was trafficking narcotics from a vehicle. Task Force Investigators arrested two men following a traffic stop and a consented-search on the east side of Binghamton.

A self-admitted CRIP gang member was determined to be in possession of three handguns (two loaded, one defaced), extra ammunition, approximately 3.27 grams of crack-cocaine, approximately 10 grams of powder-cocaine, \$5,339 cash, and a digital scale with cocaine residue on it. At the time of arrest, the arrestee was out on parole for *Criminal Possession of a Controlled Substance*.

Also arrested during the traffic stop was a passenger in the vehicle, who was in possession of fourteen small baggies of marijuana.

The first arrestee was arraigned in the City of Binghamton and was remanded to the custody of the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility. The passenger in the vehicle was released with an appearance ticket to return to City of Binghamton court.

### **Vehicle stop and search warrant yields crack-cocaine and a gun.**

The Broome County Special Investigations Unit Task Force arrested a local man following a traffic stop and search warrant execution on a vehicle he was operating. The Broome County SIU Task Force also executed a search warrant at the man's residence in the City of Binghamton. He was found to be in possession of three knotted wraps, each containing crack cocaine, \$200 in U.S. currency, a digital scale and a loaded .25 caliber semi-automatic handgun. He was arraigned in the City of Binghamton Court and remanded to the Broome County Sheriff's Office Correctional Facility to await further action in Broome County Court.

### **Street Stop yields crack-cocaine, heroin and cash.**

The Task Force received information that a man was in possession of crack-cocaine and a gun inside a City of Binghamton residence. The Task Force assembled an operational plan and stopped the target after he exited the building. Task Force Investigators arrested two men following a street stop, and execution of search warrants on their persons and a vehicle, on the west side of Binghamton. One was found to be in possession of approximately 2.8 grams of crack-cocaine, 50 envelopes containing suspected heroin, and \$728 cash. He attempted to discard the drugs onto the ground as Investigators were approaching. He was out on Parole for *Attempted Murder* in New York City. Also arrested during the traffic stop was a second man, who was in possession of 100 envelopes containing suspected heroin, and \$1,452 cash. Both men were arraigned in the City of Binghamton Court and were remanded to the custody of the Broome County Sheriff's Office Correctional Facility.

## **Counterfeit Case**

After several incidents where counterfeit \$100 bills were passed in Johnson City and the City of Binghamton, the Task Force was requested to assist the Detective Bureaus of the Johnson City and Binghamton Police Departments. After weeks of investigating, the Task Force identified their suspect, and after a successful search warrant, arrested a male for possession of narcotics, and criminal possession of a forgery device.

## **Bar gets liquor license revoked**

Originating from a Task Force investigation dating back to March 2012, the New York State Liquor Authority determined that the Scoreboard Bar, located at 85 State Street, will have its liquor license revoked. An Agent from the SLA shut down the establishment.

## **Parolee located and attempts to escape out window**

The Task Force received information that a wanted Parole Absconder was hiding inside a residence on Seminary Ave. The Task Force executed a no-knock search warrant upon the residence. Upon door breach, the suspect immediately fled out a first floor window but was quickly apprehended by Officers assigned to the perimeter. The suspect was also in possession of heroin.

## **SWAT Team Assists Task Force with Narcotics Raid**

After a three-week investigation, the Task Force, assisted by the Binghamton/Vestal/Johnson City SWAT Team and the Binghamton Police Community Response Team, arrested three men following the execution of a no-knock search warrant at a residence in the City of Binghamton. A male subject was in possession of 2 envelopes containing suspected heroin, and 32 grams of suspected powder-cocaine (which has an estimated street value of approximately \$3,200). Another male subject was in possession of 48 envelopes containing suspected heroin, along with marijuana, and \$2,700 U.S. currency. A female subject was in possession of 1 envelope of suspected heroin, and \$140 U.S. currency.



### **Dealers Arrested in Vehicle, Then Search Warrant Conducted**

The Task Force, assisted by the Binghamton Police Community Response Team, arrested two men following the execution of a narcotics search warrant during a traffic stop in downtown Binghamton. One male was in possession of 220 envelopes containing suspected heroin, 1 plastic knotted wrap containing marijuana, and \$5,087 in U.S. currency. The other was in possession of 79 envelopes containing suspected heroin, and \$198 in U.S. currency.

### **Seven Pounds of Marijuana Seized**

Stemming from a patrol street arrest where an arrestee was stopped riding his bicycle on the sidewalk carrying 4 pounds of marijuana in his backpack, further information was developed about another large-scale marijuana dealer operating in the region. The Task Force conducted a search warrant at a residence in the Village of Johnson City, which yielded another 3 pounds of marijuana and \$12,180 in U.S. currency. One suspect was charged with felony possession of marijuana.

### **Female Arrested For Cocaine Possession**

The Task Force arrested a female following the execution of a vehicle stop at the intersection of Pine Street at Rogers Ave in Endicott, NY and a subsequent search warrant of her residence in the Village of Endicott was found to be in possession of 4.4 grams of suspected crack-cocaine, an Ithaca Model #37 16-gauge shotgun, and \$795 in U.S. Currency.

### **Burglary Investigation Leads to Discovery of Makeshift Meth Lab**

As part of an ongoing BCSO burglary investigation, Investigators responded to a Tompkins Street apartment in the City of Binghamton. Once there, they made contact with two persons who were taken into custody for previously possessing stolen jewelry while at a Town of Union second hand jewelry business. The said jewelry had been stolen during a burglary at a Town of Nanticoke residence on a previous date. During the course of the burglary investigation, drug paraphernalia was located within the residence. Further investigation led to a search warrant by TF Investigators for narcotics at the residence. As a result of the search warrant execution, seven glassine envelopes containing suspected heroin were located, as well as the equipment and ingredients needed to produce methamphetamine. Both parties were charged with related burglary charges, as well as narcotics charges.

### **BU Student Caught Transporting Quarter-Kilo of Cocaine**

The Task Force arrested a Binghamton University student, following a traffic stop on the city's north side, and a subsequent search warrant his off-campus room at his fraternity house located on State Street, Binghamton, NY. The suspect was found to be in possession of more than a quarter-kilo (9.1 ounces) of suspected powder cocaine in his vehicle. (The cocaine has an estimated average street value of \$25,800.) He was traveling back to Binghamton from New York City when stopped by police. Inside his room at his fraternity house, Investigators located Ecstasy, hallucinogen mushrooms, 205.5 grams of suspected marijuana, pills, steroids, brass

knuckles, an unloaded H&R 12-gauge shotgun, a digital scale, a bottle of Inositol powder (a “cutting” agent for cocaine), and \$3,890 in U.S. currency. The Task Force also seized his 1993 Mercedes-Benz sedan.

### **Double Homicide**

Members of the TF were asked to respond to the scene of a double homicide on Lisi Lane in the Town of Binghamton. TF Investigators assisted BCSO Detectives by gathering information, securing video footage, canvassing the area, conducting interviews, and securing witness depositions.

### **Man Swallows Crack-Cocaine upon Being Stopped**

The Task Force, assisted by the Binghamton Police Community Response Team, arrested a male following the execution of a search warrant in the City of Binghamton.

When approached by Investigators, the male tampered with evidence by swallowing crack-cocaine, and was taken to a local hospital. Investigators seized 30 envelopes containing suspected heroin, and \$1,158 in U.S. currency.

The male was arraigned in City of Binghamton Court and was remanded to the custody of the Broome County Sheriff’s Office Correctional Facility.

### **Subject Arrested for Distribution of Heroin and Cocaine also found to have a Marijuana Grow Operation and a Defaced Handgun**

The Task Force arrested a male following the execution of a search warrant at his residence in the Town of Vestal. The male was found to be in possession of 101 grams of powder heroin, a plastic bag containing a chunky white substance of suspected cutting agent, 1,080 glassine envelopes containing suspected heroin, 38 more glassine envelopes containing suspected heroin, three plastic bags each containing suspected marijuana, 6 boxes each containing numerous glassine envelopes commonly used to package heroin, a digital scale, 5 marijuana plants within a marijuana grow operation, a defaced .25 caliber Colt pistol, and \$3,930 of U.S. Currency.





## **Local Bar Compliance Checks Result in Arrests**

The Task Force, with the assistance of the New York State Liquor Authority, conducted bar compliance checks on three county bars. The following is a list of the establishments that were checked and the results of the checks;

Jake's Bar located at 347 W. Service Road in the Town of Fenton: The State Liquor Authority is reviewing potential administrative violations associated with the establishment's liquor license, to include an unauthorized dice gambling game located at the establishment and for having inadequate books and records for not having employees on the payroll.

Mary's Bar located at 85 Castle Creek Road in the Town of Chenango: A bartender was charged with an ABC Law violation of Prohibited Sales of an Alcoholic Beverage to a Person Under the Age of 21, for selling an alcoholic beverage to an underage patron in the bar.

Sports Bar, formerly known as "The Finish Line," located at 1139 Upper Front Street in the Town of Chenango: The State Liquor Authority is reviewing potential administrative violations associated with the establishment's liquor license, to include unauthorized refilling of liquor bottles. In addition, a bartender was charged with an ABC Law violation of Prohibited Sales of an Alcoholic Beverage to a Person Under the Age of 21, for selling an alcoholic beverage to an underage patron in the bar.

### **Subject arrested with 14 bundles of heroin and cash**

The Task Force arrested a male following a street stop, and a subsequent search warrant execution at his residence located in the City of Binghamton.

The male was found to be in possession of 30 envelopes containing heroin when stopped, and another 111 envelopes inside his residence. Investigators also seized \$1,720 in U.S. currency.

### **Search warrant of drug house leads to five arrested**

Five people were arrested following a search warrant in the City of Binghamton. Two people were found to be in possession of crack-cocaine and digital scales. Two other people were stopped by Investigators as they attempted to leave the residence. Both were charged with Loitering, and one was found to be in possession of hypodermic needles and a dagger. A fifth person was wanted on a bench warrant issued by City of Binghamton Court for felony Grand Larceny 4<sup>th</sup>.

### **Prostitution sting leads to arrest of heroin user**

The Task Force arrested a female following a prostitution sting in the Town of Union. The female agreed to have sexual intercourse with two undercover Detectives in exchange for money. Upon being placed under arrest, the female was found to be in possession of numerous hypodermic needles and a small amount of heroin. She was also wanted on active arrest warrants out of the Village of Johnson City Court and the Town of Dickinson Court.

**Man with 8 Arrest Warrants captured as he attempted  
to flee while discarding narcotics**

The Task Force arrested a local man following a street stop at the intersection of Watson Blvd. and McKinley Ave. in the Village of Endicott. The man was wanted on an active Arrest Warrant issued by the Village of Endicott Court on eight separate charges. He was walking near the intersection when detectives approached him. He attempted to run from police and in the process attempted to discard narcotics. He was taken into custody and was found to be in possession of crack cocaine, as well as Oxycodone and Morphine pills.

**Man arrested after discarding heroin and attempting to  
flee from Detectives on foot**

The Task Force arrested a male subject following a street-stop in the City of Binghamton, and a subsequent search warrant at a residence in the City of Binghamton. The male attempted to run while throwing heroin, but was arrested after a brief foot chase. He was found to be in possession of heroin, crack-cocaine, and \$206 U.S. Currency.

**Man arrested after making deal to sell heroin to undercover Detective**

The Task Force executed a narcotics search warrant on a male subject and a vehicle he was operating. The male was located operating a vehicle on Robinson Street in the City of Binghamton and was stopped and taken into custody pursuant to the search warrant. He was found to be in possession of 4 glassine envelopes each containing heroin. He had previously agreed to sell heroin to an undercover officer.

**SWAT Team Assists Task Force with  
Raid on a Gang Member with Guns**

The Task Force, assisted by the Binghamton-Johnson City-Vestal joint SWAT team, raided an apartment in the City of Binghamton, and arrested a self-admitted *Latin King* gang member. The subject was immediately captured after he attempted to flee out a back door where additional Officers were positioned.

The male was found to be in possession of a loaded stolen .32 caliber revolver handgun, and a sawed-off 20-gauge shotgun.

**Heroin Initiative #1**

In a collaborative effort, the Task Force launched an aggressive initiative to target and arrest illegal drug users in an effort to suppress other crimes. Investigators worked various hours and arrested several illegal drug addicts. Trends demonstrate that severe addicts commit larcenies and burglaries to support their habits. Overall, 21 charges resulted in the two-day sting. A second heroin initiative attempt is set for June.

## Heroin Initiative #2

In a continuation from last month’s Heroin Initiative #1, the Task Force launched its second round of aggressive targeting of illegal heroin users in an effort to suppress other crimes. Investigators worked various hours and made several arrests.

## Bath Salts and Synthetic Marijuana sweep

The Task Force, along with the NYSP SIU unit, and the Broome County Health Department conducted a county-wide sweep for Bath Salts and Synthetic Marijuana. An undercover Detective with the Broome County Task Force was utilized. The undercover Detective attempted to purchase Bath Salts and/or Synthetic Marijuana at nine (9) different businesses in the Broome County area. Two businesses were found to be selling said substances.

## Shoulder Tap Detail

The Task Force conducted a new detail entitled “Shoulder Tap” county-wide on June 12. This initiative was the result of recent studies in which youth have reported that adults aged 21 and older are their most common source of alcohol. During this operation, a minor (under the age of 21) works under the direct supervision of law enforcement. At our direction, the minor would solicit adults outside a convenience store to buy alcohol for the minor. The Task Force utilized two underage decoys for this detail. Nine locations were targeted in a 6-hour period, with 3 total arrested, each charged with ABC Law- Prohibited Sales.

### **Traffic stop leads to arrest of woman with 44 baggies of heroin**

Task Force members arrested a local female following a traffic stop on Robinson Street in the City of Binghamton. The female was found to be in possession of 44 glassine envelopes containing heroin and a small amount of marijuana. She was arraigned in the City of Binghamton Court and remanded to the custody of the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility.

### **Man found with 6 pounds of marijuana in trailer**

Task Force members executed a no-knock search warrant at a trailer park in the Town of Maine, and arrested the resident. The male resident was found to be in possession of nearly 6 pounds of marijuana, and approximately \$1,200 cash. He had several small children present in the trailer with marijuana accessible in several areas. He was arraigned in the Town of Maine Court and remanded to the custody of the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility.

### **Task Force assists Warrants Unit in manhunt for suspected rapist**

Task Force members assisted the U.S. Marshal's Fugitive Task Force in the search for a suspected rapist in various locations in the City of Binghamton and Town of Kirkwood. Task Force Investigators conducted long durations of surveillance on several locations, and teamed up to clear selected locations. The suspect was eventually located at a nearby hotel and surrendered, ending a 3 week manhunt.

### **Man struggles with Officers during a traffic stop, after being observed injecting drugs**

Task Force members arrested a Town of Union man following a vehicle stop on Liberty Street in the City of Binghamton. The male did agree to sell a quantity of heroin to another person. Upon being stopped, the male struggled with Officers while being detained, and swallowed numerous bags of heroin. He was found to be in possession of 15 paper folds each containing heroin and two hypodermic syringes one of which was loaded with methamphetamine. The male subject was remanded to the custody of the Broome County Sheriff's Office Correctional Facility.

### **Task Force arrests man with marijuana and weapons**

Task Force members arrested a City of Binghamton man following the execution of a search warrant. The man was found to be in possession of marijuana, and illegal switchblade knives and brass knuckles. He was issued an appearance ticket to return to City of Binghamton Court.

### **Man arrested with 1 pound of marijuana, shotgun, and cash**

Task Force members, assisted by a Johnson City Police Department K-9 unit, arrested a Village of Johnson City man following a search warrant in the City of Binghamton. The male was found to be in possession of approximately 1 pound of marijuana, a 12-gauge shotgun, and \$3,700 in U.S. currency. He was arraigned in City of Binghamton court and remanded to the custody of the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility.

### **Task Force Investigators assist Binghamton Detectives with shooting**

Task Force Investigators were called in early to assist Binghamton Patrol/Detectives with a shooting investigation on Roberts Street. Task Force Investigators interviewed the shooting suspect, and assisted Detectives with a house search of a residence on Roberts Street where they found cocaine. Investigators also detained several parties wanted in questioning by Detectives. A man from NYC was charged with Attempted Murder and other related charges.

### **Local man suspected in several larcenies, arrested after selling a bundle of heroin to an Undercover Officer**

Task Force members, assisted by the Binghamton Police Community Response Team, arrested a local man following a traffic stop in the City of Binghamton. The male subject sold ten (10) envelopes of heroin to an undercover Officer. He was arraigned in City of Binghamton Court and was remanded to the custody of the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility.

### **Man arrested with crack, heroin and cash during traffic stop**

Task Force members, arrested a male subject following a traffic stop in the City of Binghamton. He was in possession of 19 grams of crack-cocaine, 10 folded envelopes containing heroin, and \$242 in U.S. currency. He was arraigned in the City of Binghamton Court and was remanded to the custody of the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility.

### **Woman arrested after search warrant yields heroin and cash**

Task Force members, assisted by a Broome County Sheriff's Office K-9 unit, arrested a City of Binghamton woman following a search warrant in the City of Binghamton. The female was in possession of 20 envelopes containing heroin, marijuana, and \$7,330 in U.S. currency. She was arraigned in City of Binghamton court and remanded to the custody of the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility.

### **Hotel Internet Prostitution Sting Leads to Arrests**

In response to internet prostitution complaints/incidents, some of which resulted in assaults, larcenies, and robberies of solicitors, the Task Force conducted an internet prostitution sting at a local hotel, utilizing both male and female undercover officers. Investigators created and posted an ad for a female prostitute on an internet prostitution site, a popular free site for escorts. Our intention was to target the "johns" who solicit female internet prostitutes, and to target internet prostitutes who make local out-calls. Over 20 calls were placed to internet prostitutes. TF members arrested 4 people with 7 charges.

### **An Endicott man is arrested after selling heroin to an undercover officer on two prior occasions**

The Task Force arrested an Endicott man during a street stop on North Street in the Village of Endicott after he had previously sold heroin to undercover officers on two separate dates. He

was arraigned in the Town of Union Court and was remanded to the custody of the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility.

### **Task Force arrests two men for possessing heroin and loaded hypodermic needles**

Two males were arrested by Task Force members following a street stop on Main Street in the City of Binghamton. The males were both found to be in possession of a bag containing heroin, hypodermic syringes, a loaded hypodermic syringe containing heroin and a loaded hypodermic syringe containing Opana, a controlled substance. The men were issued appearance tickets and are scheduled to appear in the City of Binghamton Court at a later date to answer their charges.

### **A Binghamton woman is arrested after search warrant yields heroin, digital scales and cash**

Task Force members executed a no-knock search warrant at a house on Lydia Street in the City of Binghamton. The resident was found to be in possession of 57 glassine envelopes containing heroin, digital scales and \$4,222 in U.S. currency. She was held at the Binghamton Police Department until her arraignment the following morning where she was remanded to the custody of the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility.

### **Task Force Investigators assist Johnson City Police Department with Homicide Investigation**

Task Force Investigators were called to assist JCPD/BPD Detectives with a homicide investigation. Task Force Investigators provided valuable information on the whereabouts of the suspects who were being sought in connection with the murder. Task Force Investigators also assisted with interviews. Two men were arrested and one was charged with Murder in the Second Degree.

### **An Endwell man was found in possession of multiple prescription drugs and marijuana during a search warrant execution and is charged with selling heroin to an undercover officer**

An Endwell man was arrested by the Task Force following a search warrant execution at his residence in the Town of Union. He was found to be in possession of 31 pills of Clozapem (a Schedule IV controlled substance), 17 pills of Alprazolam, (a Schedule IV controlled substance), 7 Suboxone sublingual film strips (a Schedule III controlled substance) and a small amount of marijuana. He was also charged with having previously sold heroin to an undercover officer on two separate dates while in the Town of Union. The man was arraigned on two felonies, three misdemeanors and a violation charge and was remanded to the custody of the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility following his arraignment.



**Task Force Investigators intercept a local man  
attempting to sell prescription drugs to another person**

A City of Binghamton man was arrested by the Task Force while he was attempting to sell prescription drugs to another person. Task Force Investigators executed a narcotics search warrant on the subject and a vehicle he was operating on Broad Ave. in the City of Binghamton. He was found to be in possession of 100 Hydrocodone pills, which are a controlled substance. He obtained and possessed the pills illegally and had his three year old son present in the vehicle with him while he was attempting to sell the Hydrocodone pills to another person. A hotline report was made with the NYS Office of Children and Family Services. He was arraigned in the City of Binghamton Court and is being held without bail at the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility.

**Man arranges to sell heroin to Undercover Detective,  
which leads to foot pursuit through residential yards**

The Task Force arrested a male subject following a foot chase through back yards on Floral and Cleveland Avenue in Binghamton. The male attempted to lure the Detective into an apartment hallway before being approached by other Officers. This male was charged with *Attempted Criminal Sale of a Controlled Substance in the Third Degree* and *Resisting Arrest* after making arrangements to sell heroin to a Detective operating in an undercover capacity. He also had an active Broome County arrest warrant for *Criminal Sale of a Controlled Substance in the Third Degree*.

**Man arrested with 5 lbs. of marijuana, rifle, and heroin**

The Task Force executed a narcotics search warrant at a residence located on Prospect Street in the City of Binghamton. Located during the search were five pounds of marijuana, four glassine envelopes containing heroin, a .22 caliber Springfield rifle, a pair of chukka sticks and \$288 in U.S. currency. The resident was not home at the time the search warrant was executed, but was located a short time later. He was issued appearance tickets to appear in the City of Binghamton Court at a later date to answer said charges.

**Women arrested for Prostitution**

The Task Force arrested three females in downtown City of Binghamton, each for prostitution. The women agreed to engage in a sexual act for a monetary fee with Detectives operating in an undercover capacity. Additionally, one of the women had two outstanding bench warrants issued by the Town of Vestal Court.

**Female arrested for possessing stolen handgun, crack-cocaine, and heroin**

The Task Force executed a narcotics search warrant at a residence located in the Town of Union. Located during the search were 416 glassine bags of heroin, 44.6 grams of crack cocaine and a stolen Smith & Wesson .38 special revolver handgun. The female resident was arrested and remanded to the custody of the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility without bail. The

Broome County SIU Task Force was assisted by a Broome County Sheriff's Office Highway Patrol canine unit.



### **Gang member RICO case**

SIU Investigators have begun amassing a list of known local street gang members who have been involved in violent and illegal gang activity, or have ties or associations to such. Investigators are compiling data, police reports, and criminal histories in order to correlate or categorize members of local street gangs, with intentions of a future RICO case prosecution. At this time, approximately several dozen case files are being evaluated.

### **Marijuana plants discovered after flyover**

75 Marijuana plants were discovered in the Town of Conklin after being discovered during an aerial flyover. The plants were eradicated and destroyed by members of the TF. The elderly female farm owner not charged.

### **Dealer arrested with cocaine and pills**

The TF arrested a male subject following the execution of a narcotics search warrant in the City of Binghamton. The male was found to be in possession of approximately 2 grams of powder cocaine, approximately 25 grams of crack-cocaine, prescription pills, and U.S currency. He was arraigned in City of Binghamton Court and remanded to the custody of the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility.

**Street interdiction stop leads to charges on dealer  
who had previously sold heroin to Undercover TF Detective**

The TF arrested a man who had left the Binghamton area for several months, during a traffic stop on Duke Street in the City of Binghamton. The male was found to be in possession of heroin and marijuana at the time of stop. Once TF Detectives realized who he was, this male was also charged with 3 counts of selling heroin to an undercover Detective on three different dates in June of 2013 in the City of Binghamton. The heroin envelopes seized during the traffic stop matched the envelopes purchased by the undercover Detective in June. He was arraigned in the City of Binghamton Court and remanded to the custody of the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility.

**Street stop, and search warrant of residence leads to gun, drugs, money**

The Task Force, assisted by the Binghamton Police Community Response Team, arrested a male subject following the execution of a narcotics search warrant in the City of Binghamton. He was found to be in possession of 171 baggies of heroin, \$441 U.S. currency, a loaded defaced .22 caliber Ruger handgun, and extra ammunition.

**Search warrant of residence results in several charges for female**

The Task Force arrested a female subject following the execution of a narcotics search warrant in the City of Binghamton. She was found to be in possession of 46 glassine bags of heroin, 3 knotted wraps of crack cocaine, a baggie of marijuana, a live marijuana plant and ecstasy pills. Her five year old son was present at the residence while the narcotics were accessible to the child. A hotline report was made with the NYS Office of Children and Family Services. The child was not injured during this incident and is staying with family at this time. The female was remanded to the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility.

**Search warrant of residence leads to heroin, marijuana, money, and arrest of a female with outstanding warrant.**

The Task Force, assisted by the Binghamton Police Community Response Team, arrested a man and a woman following the execution of a narcotics search warrant in the City of Binghamton. The male was found to be in possession of 19 baggies of heroin, 2.4 ounces of marijuana, and \$250 U.S. currency. The female had an outstanding arrest warrant for *Loitering in the First degree* out of City of Binghamton Court.

**Search warrant at Town of Chenango Motel leads to  
heroin and crack-cocaine**

The Task Force executed a narcotics search warrant on a male subject while at a local Town of Chenango motel. The male was found to be in possession of 92 glassine bags containing heroin and approximately 2 grams of crack cocaine. A female was found to be in possession of one glassine bag containing heroin. The Broome County Special Investigations Unit Task Force then

executed a narcotics search warrant at the female's residence located on Clinton Street in the City of Binghamton. Numerous items of drug paraphernalia were located at the residence. The female was issued an appearance ticket and is scheduled to appear in the Town of Chenango Court at a later date. The man was arraigned in the Town of Chenango Court and is currently being held without bail at the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility.

#### **Search Warrant leads to arrest of heroin, crack dealers**

The Task Force arrested a male and female on Arthur Avenue in the Village of Endicott following a street stop and search warrant execution. The male was found to be in possession of 45 glassine bags containing heroin and \$458.00 in U.S. currency. The female was found to be in possession of a knotted wrap containing crack cocaine. The male was arraigned in the Village of Endicott Court and was remanded to the custody of the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility without bail. The female was released on an appearance ticket and is scheduled to appear in the Village of Endicott Court at a later date.

#### **Recovery of stolen property from Internet classified site**

The Task Force assisted the City of Binghamton Police Department in recovering a stolen compound hunting bow from the Craigslist classifieds Internet site. A Task Force detective, acting in an undercover capacity, made contact with the seller of the stolen property and made arrangements to meet while posing as a possible buyer of the property. The stolen property was successfully recovered. The case is being handled by the Binghamton Police Department.

#### **Search Warrant leads to arrest of heroin dealer**

The Task Force arrested a female following the execution of a narcotics search warrant in the Village of Endicott. She was found to be in possession of 537 glassine bags containing heroin, 12 knotted wraps containing crack cocaine, 2 knotted wraps containing marijuana and \$1,287.00 in U.S. currency. The female was arraigned in the Village of Endicott Court and was remanded to the custody of the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility without bail.

#### **Man stopped with loaded handgun, and drugs**

A man was stopped and arrested at the Shortline bus station in Binghamton, NY and found to be in possession of heroin and cocaine, and a stolen loaded handgun. The suspect was preparing to board a bus headed to NYC when detained. He was charged with numerous weapons and narcotics possession charges, and remanded to the custody of the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility.

#### **Man arrested for stealing property from railroad cars**

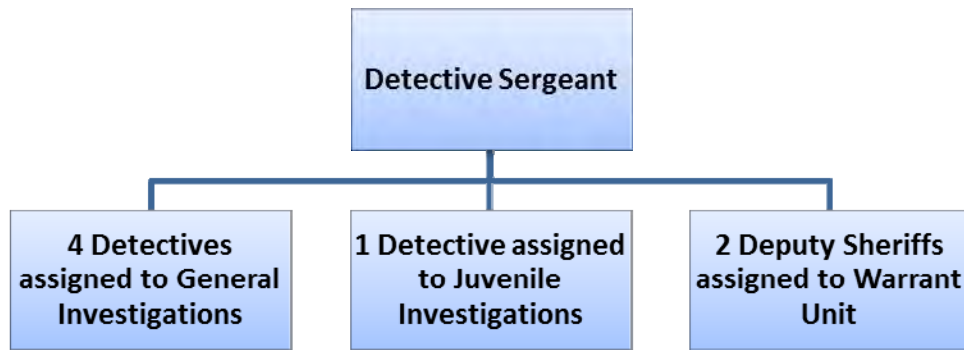
A search warrant was executed upon the residence of a suspect believed to be responsible for the larceny of dozens of televisions from a railroad car. Investigators located a portion of the stolen property, and charged the suspect with multiple counts of possession of stolen property.

### **Endwell man arrested for manufacturing methamphetamine and possession of explosives**

The Task Force, assisted by the Broome-Endicott Swat Team and the Endicott Bomb Squad, raided a house in the Town of Union after an investigation revealed that an occupant of the home was manufacturing methamphetamine and was in possession of a homemade explosive device. Further investigation revealed that the man was a fugitive of justice from another state. The male subject was wanted by the State of Illinois for manufacture of methamphetamine and possession of explosives. This subject was found to have been manufacturing methamphetamine and improvised explosive devices within the home. Approximately 10 ounces of methamphetamine oil along with several items of laboratory equipment, precursors, solvents, and reagents used in the manufacture of methamphetamine were located inside. The target of the investigation and another female were additionally charged with Criminal Facilitation.

# **DETECTIVE DIVISION**

The Broome County Sheriff’s Office Detective Division is comprised of two Detective Sergeants who supervise two units. The General Investigations Unit sergeant supervises four general investigations detectives, one juvenile detective and two deputies who are assigned to the Warrant Division. The Special Investigations Unit Sergeant supervises five SIU Detectives who are also assigned to the Broome County Special Investigations Unit Task Force. Members assigned to the Detective Division maintain the sex offender registry, DNA gathering registry and evidence control. Members are assigned to the Southern Tier Child Predator Task Force, Operation Impact, Child Advocacy Case Review Committee, Gang Task Force Meetings, Counter Terrorism Zone Meetings, Bank Security Meetings and Retail Security Meetings. Members also provide presentations to various government and private groups.

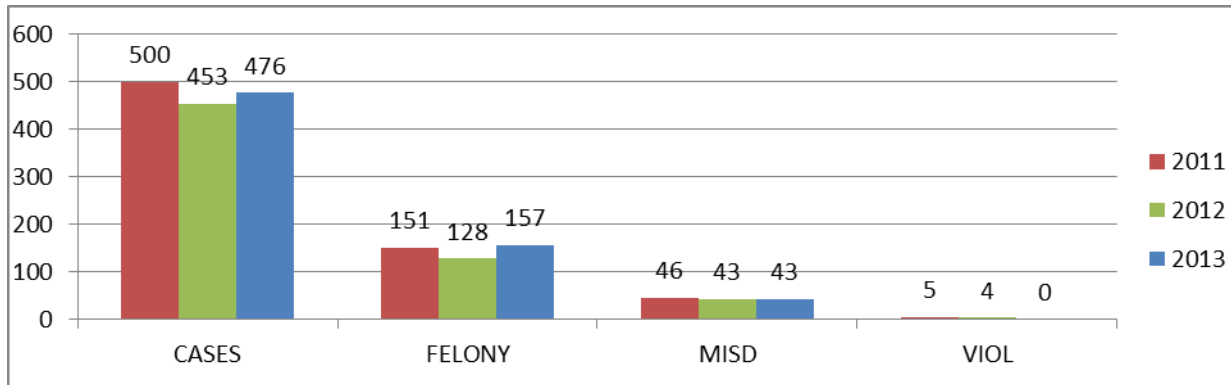

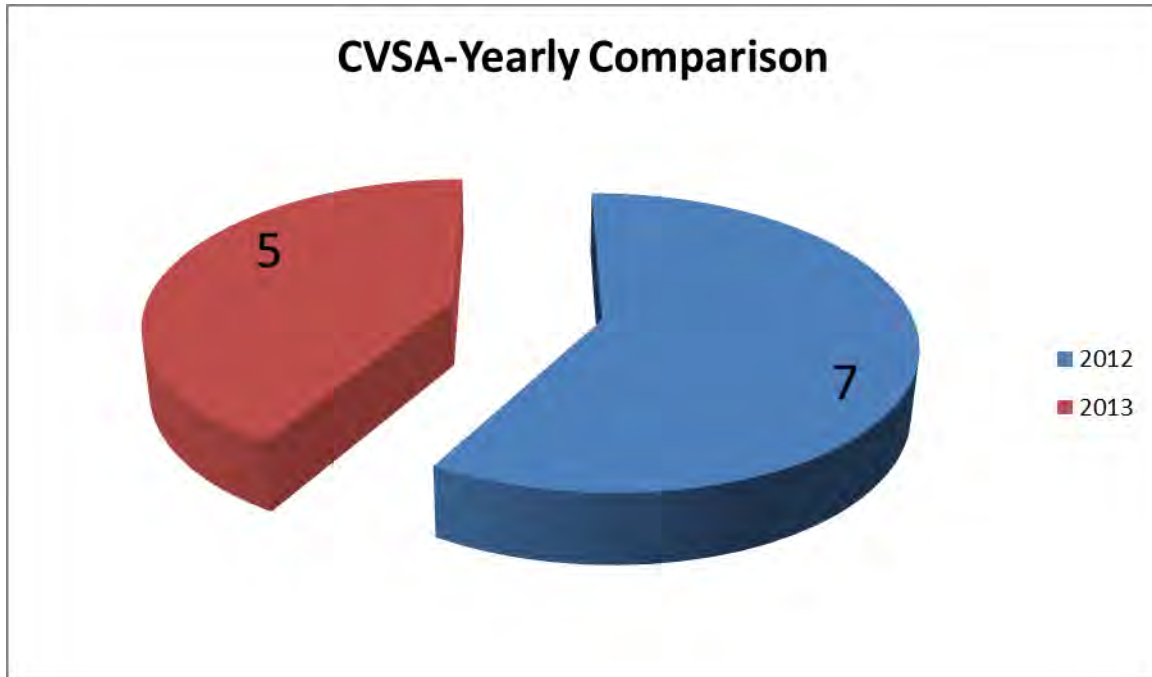
**CASE AND ARREST COMPARISON 2011-2013**

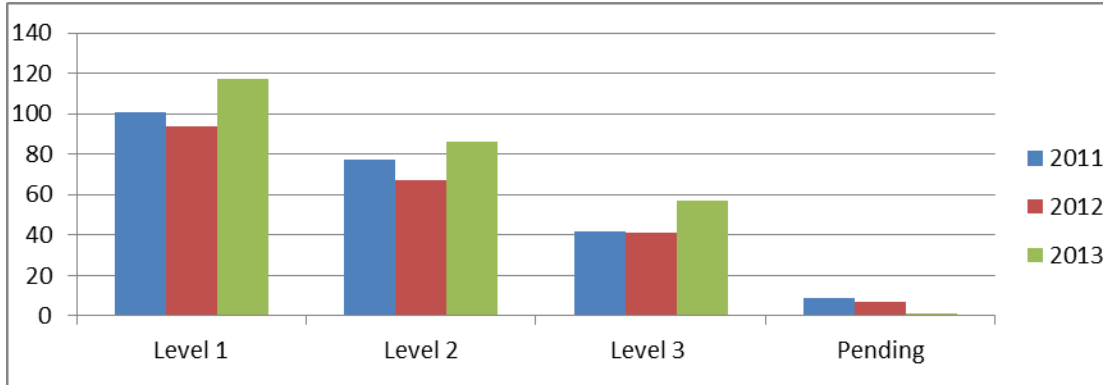


## **SEX OFFENDER MONITORING**

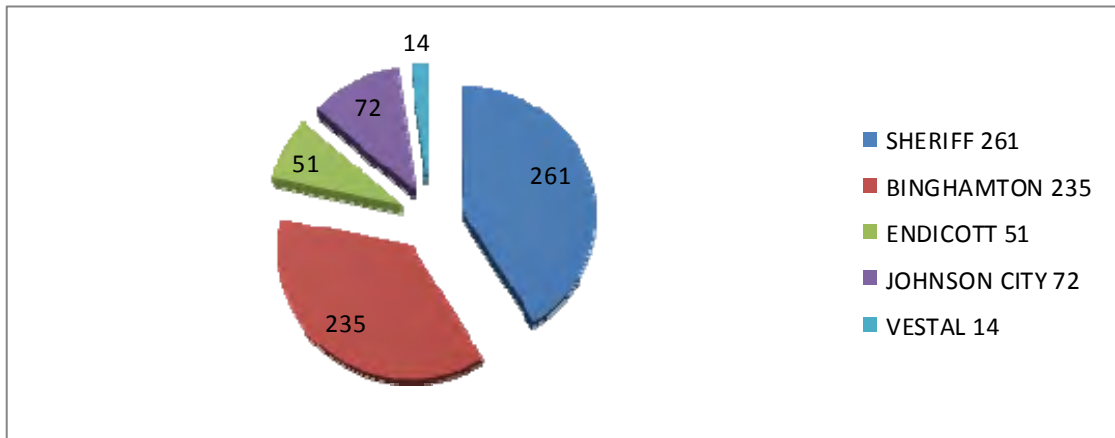

We work in partnership with area law enforcement agencies and provide a notification service through *OffenderWatch*®. Our office is pleased to provide *OffenderWatch*® for the citizens of Broome County. *OffenderWatch*® is the nation's leading registered sex offender management and community notification tool with hundreds of leading agencies in dozens of states utilizing it. Broome County's law enforcement utilizes *OffenderWatch*® to manage and monitor the whereabouts, conduct and compliance status of the registered offenders in Broome County. *OffenderWatch*® provides the most accurate and timely information available and now this information is available to you! *OffenderWatch*® is updated instantaneously throughout the day as offender addresses and other offender information is updated in our Office. You may enter any address in the County and see real-time information on the publishable offenders within the specified radius of the address you enter.

Offenders move frequently. Instead of checking the maps on a weekly basis, the best way to stay informed is to take advantage of our free email alert system. You may confidentially register as many addresses in the County as you wish, and we will continuously monitor the addresses and send you an email alert if a new offender registers an address within the specified radius of any address you register. There is no cost for this service and no limit to the number of addresses you can register - your email address and physical addresses are all confidential. **WARRANT UNIT**

The Warrant Control Unit of the Broome County Sheriff's Office is comprised of two, (2) Deputy Sheriffs under the direction of the Detectives Sergeant assigned to General Investigations. The unit is responsible for the management of warrants issued to the Broome County Sheriff's Office by Broome County Supreme Court, Broome County Family Court and local Justice Courts throughout Broome County. The deputies assigned to the unit insure entry of each warrant received into the Broome County Public Safety System and NYSPIN (New York State Police Information System) to readily identify wanted persons who may be encountered by Police Officers locally or nationwide.

The Broome County Sheriff's Office continues to work with New York/New Jersey Regional Fugitive Task Force. Four Sheriff's Office members are sworn United States Deputy Marshals. They work along with members of the Marshal's Service, Binghamton Police Department and New York State Police. The task force increased the resources available to better track fugitives, not only in New York State, but across the country.

The Warrant Control Unit distributes the warrants issued by Local Criminal Courts to Highway Patrol Deputies for execution and monitors the action taken. The Unit is responsible for the execution of all Broome County Court and Broome County Family Court warrants. In addition to New York State, the Unit is responsible for the extradition of wanted subjects that are located outside of New York State.

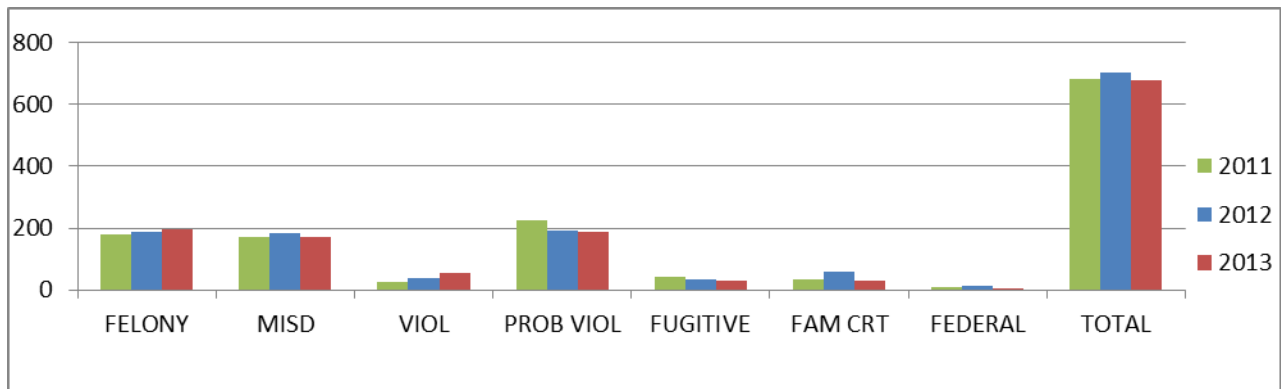

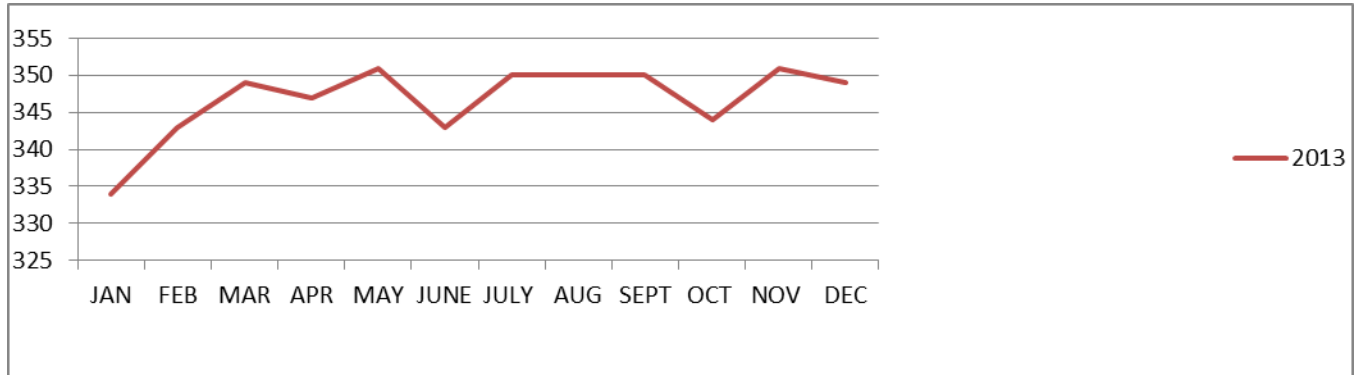

## NOTABLE CASES FROM 2013

### Jewelry Store Robbery



**TY TUMMINIA**

On January 25, 2013, Ty Tumminia walked into the Ruby and Son Jewelry store on Front Street in the Town of Chenango and displayed what appeared to be a bomb in order to commit a robbery. Tumminia fled the scene with jewelry and discarded the bomb while fleeing. Sheriff's personnel recovered the device, which was determined to be a false bomb, in the backyard of a nearby residence. After a three day investigation, Tumminia was taken into custody by detectives and charged with robbery in the first degree and placing a false bomb in the first



degree, both felonies. Tumminia plead guilty to placing a false bomb and is serving a three year prison term.



## Double Homicide



**Arrested: Aaron Powell 12-19-1973**

On March 22, 2013 the Broome County Sheriff's Office responded to a check the welfare complaint at 4185 Lisi Lane in the Town of Binghamton. Family members of Christina Powell had contacted the Sheriff's Office after they had trouble contacting her. Deputies forced entry into the Powell residence and discovered the body of a male homicide victim. The victim, identified as Mario Masciarelli was located in an upstairs bedroom. Upon a further search of the residence the body of Christina was located in the basement. It was determined that she was also the victim of a homicide. Four days after the discovery of the bodies, Aaron Powell was charged

by detectives with two counts of Murder in the second degree. Aaron Powell remains in the Broome County Sheriff's Correctional Facility awaiting trial.



### **Sex Offense/Missing Person**



**PAUL TERWILLIGER: 8-14-1958**

Paul Terwilliger was arrested on April 29, 2013 for the offense of Course of Sexual Conduct Against a Child, a felony. Terwilliger was accused of engaging in sexual intercourse over an extended period of time with a child less than 11 years of age.

On May 8, 2013, the Broome County Sheriff's Office received a missing persons report on Terwilliger after he was bailed out on the criminal charges. On May 9, 2013, an extensive search

was conducted by the Sheriff's Office, New York State Forest Rangers, Broome County Emergency Services Search Team, Community Emergency Response Team, SCUBA Team and Chenango Bridge Fire Company. Terwilliger could not be located in the area surrounding his home.

On November 16, 2013 Terwilliger's body was located by a hunter in a wooded area off Airport Road in the Town of Chenango. It appeared that Terwilliger took his own life shortly after being reported missing.

## **Sex Offender**



**TIMOTHY RATHBUN 1-13-1982**

On May 30, 2013 Timothy Rathbun was arrested in Syracuse, New York. Rathbun is a New York State Registered Sex Offender, Level 2. Rathbun moved from his registered address in the Town of Triangle to Syracuse New York without changing his address with New York State within the required time period. Rathbun was charged with Failure to register a change of address, a felony.

## **Burglary/Grand larceny**



**GREGORY ROUGHT 11-22-1968**

On August 14, 2013, a burglary was reported from E Systems Group in the Town of Conklin. An estimated \$19,000 in tools and equipment had been stolen in the overnight hours. An investigation by detectives revealed Gregory A Rought was responsible for the burglary. Rought was charged with Burglary in the third degree and Grand Larceny in the third degree, both felonies. Rought currently is awaiting trial on the charges.

## **Sex Offense**



**THOMAS BELL 1-3-1957**

On September 20, 2013, Broome County Sheriff's Detectives executed a search warrant at 338 Oakdale Road in the Town of Union in relation to a child pornography case. Upon executing the warrant, detectives located a computer that was currently downloading child pornography from a file sharing site. The occupant of the residence Thomas Bell 50 years of age, who was not present at his home when detectives entered was located in the Town of Vestal and taken into custody. Bell was charged with Promoting A Sexual Performance Of A Child, a felony. Bell's case is still awaiting trial.



# Law Enforcement Training Division

The Law Enforcement Training Division is the home of the New York State Zone 6 Law Enforcement Academy. The Zone 6 Academy provides training for 40 police agencies in 7 counties. Agencies of and in those 7 counties; Broome, Chenango, Cortland, Delaware, Tioga, Tompkins and Otsego depend on the Academy to provide a wide range of in-service training for veteran officers as well as the Basic Course for Police Officers to train newly hired officers.

The Broome County Sheriff's Law Enforcement Academy is regarded as a premier New York State Basic Police Officer Academy. Over 45 instructors from a wide variety of agencies and disciplines instruct at the Academy. The Academy provides more certifications than 70% of Academies in New York State, while maintaining a very low cost for attendance. Furthermore, the Broome County Sheriff's Law Enforcement Academy is the 2<sup>nd</sup> longest Academy in New York State regarding content and length of training. The Basic Academy consists of 1,320 hours of training. The 2013 Academy Session graduated 29 Recruits from 10 different agencies.

Our facility regularly receives compliments by their staff, the instructors they provide and the many visitors we receive as a result of hosting DCJS training.

# Community Policing Division

## School Resource Officer

The Community Policing Divisions is comprised of one full – time deputy. This deputy is responsible for all community service projects as well as serving as a full time School Resource Officer. The School Resource Officer program is a collaborative effort by certified law enforcement officers, educators, students, parents and the community to offer educational programs in the schools to reduce crime, drug abuse, and violence and provide a safe environment. It is the responsibility of the deputy to focus on the needs of the schools and assist the administration in accomplishing their goals.

The School Resource Officer is committed to promoting a concept of school based law enforcement. This TRIAD concept allows the School Resource Officer to act as a teacher, counselor and law Enforcement officer. School Resource Officers work with students, parents and school staff on a daily basis. The deputy is required to develop and teach lessons to students on numerous subjects. Officers also assist students, parents, and staff as counselors. Counseling sessions may be for behavioral problems or for persons in crisis. The deputy talks to students regarding careers in law enforcement. The deputy also assists the school in their disaster planning issues. They conduct investigations of incidents in and around the school. They also make any arrests as a result of these investigations.

The Broome County Sheriff’s School Resource Officer works in the Maine Endwell School District, as well as the Chenango Valley School District. This partnership of law enforcement, school district, parents and the community, provides a safe and successful learning environment.

## **School Resource Officer Advancement**

This position has remained proactive, responding to more priority calls near or around the school that the Deputy is in. In 2012, the SRO has increased the number tickets for people who passed stopped school buses with red lights flashing, with strict enforcement; the Sheriff's Office saw a decrease in school bus violations in 2013. The tickets dropped from 35 issued in 2012 to 17 issued in 2013. The Sheriff's Office is committed to proactive measures in keeping Broome County students safe.

The SRO was issued a 2013 Chevrolet Caprice PPV Patrol Vehicle. The vehicle is outfitted with an in car camera system and dual stalker radar, as well as all the standard equipment that a regular patrol vehicle has. The patrol car has been kept as a "slick top" patrol, meaning no roof lights are attached and only interior/covert emergency lights. The SRO was also issued an H&K G36 rifle in addition to the issued shotgun. With the increase of school shootings in the United States, it's imperative that the SRO and all deputies have adequate equipment.



## **School Safety Advancement**

The Community Policing Division has devised a strategic plan to increase school safety in the event of an emergency. School building layouts were obtained from each school district and college in Broome County. These layouts were scanned, labeled and added to each Sheriff Patrol vehicle computer, as well as the Mobile Command vehicle and SWAT vehicle. By having instant access to building layouts, the first arriving officers can easily determine in which part of the building they may be needed. This information was shared with Broome County Emergency Services as well as other law enforcement agencies.

The SRO attended the National School Safety Conference in July 2013. The SRO obtained information on new school safety tactics and technologies that benefited other school districts. This valuable knowledge was brought to area school districts in an effort to share vital school safety information.

The Community Policing Division, in collaboration with the Training Division, also sponsored a "DITEP" (Drug Impairment Training for Educational Professions) training for local school

districts. Many educators, school administrators and School Resource Officers attended this court. The course was paid for by the Governors Traffic Safety Committee.

## Neighborhood Watch Programs

The Broome County Sheriff's Office continues to work with the citizens within the County, helping them establish Neighborhood Watch groups. This program encourages citizens to be active within their neighborhood in preventing crime and assisting the police by being good observers in the community. The Broome County Sheriff's Office added one new Neighborhood Watch groups to bring the total up to 26 groups.



## Safe Senior Programs

The community policing division educated many seniors this year on the issues of telemarketing fraud, investment scams, auto safety and theft prevention. Programs were offered at local senior centers and housing and area churches. Many donations from area businesses provided the opportunity for the Sheriff's Office to purchase several hundred "Senior Safe" pamphlets that were distributed to various seniors in Broome County.

The Sheriff's Office paired up with the New York State Sheriffs' Association and started the Yellow DOT Program in Broome County. Working hand in hand with the Office for Aging, Department of Health and the NYS Sheriff's Association, the Sheriff's Office was able to distribute several thousand Yellow DOT stickers/packets to Broome County residents. The Yellow DOT is a decal that is placed on a driver's vehicle, and within the glove compartment, contains a yellow folder with the driver's vital medical information in the event of an emergency. The Yellow DOT Program is 100% free and provided by the NYS Sheriff's Association.

## Grants

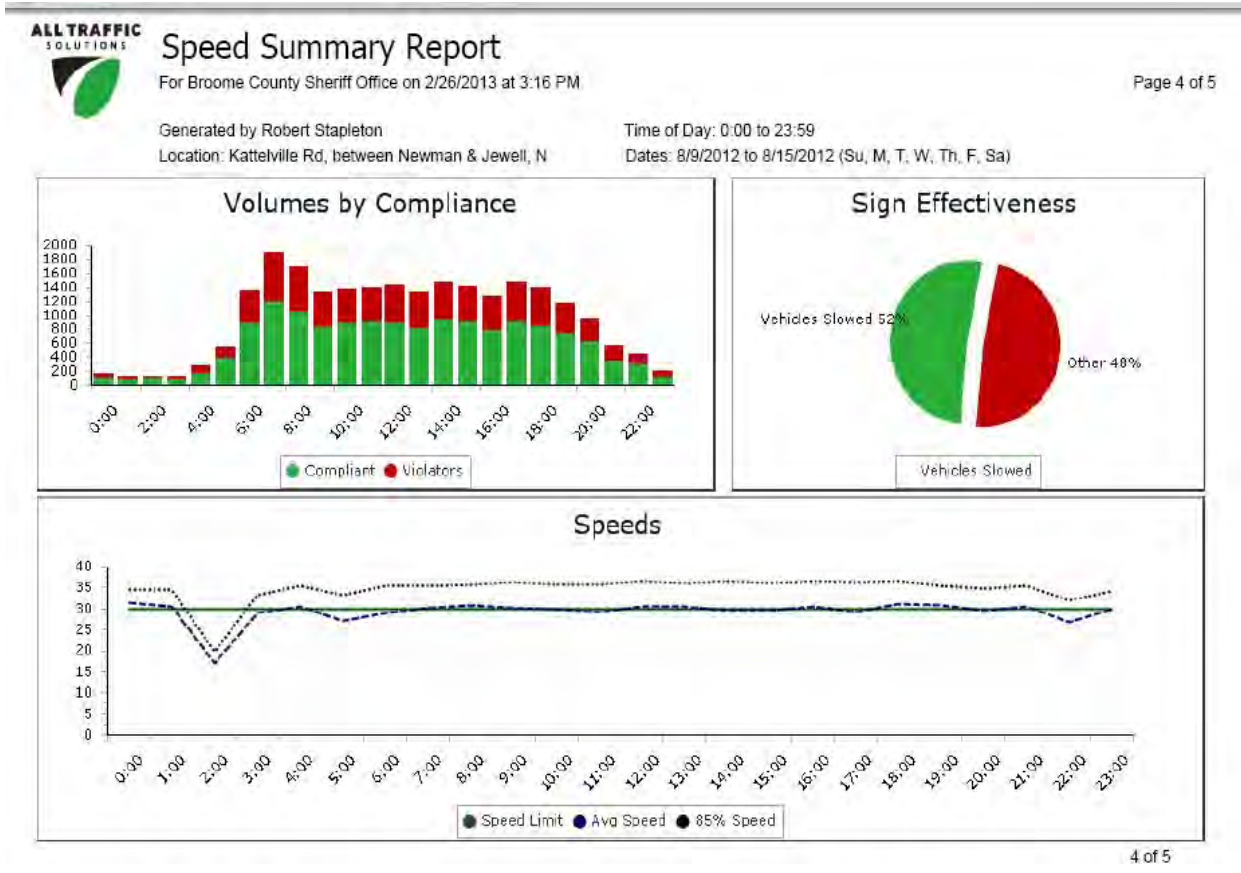
The Community Policing Office authored 2 grants for the 2013 year. These grants totaled \$17,100. The grants were provided through the Governors Traffic Safety Committee. Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP). This \$15,000 grant paid for additional patrol hours on Broome County highways. Deputies used these hours to curb aggressive driving habits, thus lowering motor vehicle accidents attributed to aggressive driving. Along with the additional hours, we were able to purchase traffic enforcement equipment for our patrol vehicle. This included advanced and up to date radar systems, and two new laser guns for stealth mode enforcement.

Buckle Up New York (BUNY Campaign). This grant was for a total of \$1,500, and was used to place additional patrol hours on Broome County Highways to curb the nonuse of seat belt violations.

## Speed Trailers

The Broome County Sheriff's Office recently upgraded our two speed trailers. The speed trailers are self-contained units that are equipped with their own power source and speed-measuring equipment. Solar panels have been added to both trailers that have allowed for the trailers to be self sufficient power sources which has saved time and fuel. Along with the upgrade, both trailers can be remotely accessed via the internet and cellular communications. This allows for deputies to access statistics that aid in providing patrol enforcement for an area. The trailers now have the capability to display safety messages as well as emergency messages, such as an AMBER alert.

Once the trailers are set up, it is announced in roll call for deputies to not only check on the trailers, but to provide extra patrol in the areas of request. With the new capability of data statistics, it allows for more efficient enforcement within certain times. The speed trailers were deployed in more than 30 different locations in 2013.



## Social Media Outreach – Facebook

The Broome County Sheriff's Office started its own Facebook page in 2012, and it has evolved into a vital part of community outreach in 2013. The page has allowed the Sheriff's Office to post press releases, recent arrests, motor vehicle accidents, missing persons, road closures, home and personal safety tips, as well as other law enforcement topics and information. The Facebook page has allowed the Sheriff's Office to interact with the community on a more personal level, and often updates them faster than the newspaper or television. The Facebook page has aided in numerous cases, resulting in identifying suspects of crimes, to assisting in finding missing persons.

## Social Media Outreach – Mobile Patrol Smart Phone App

In 2013, the Sheriff's Office adopted a free smart phone application called "Mobile Patrol". Users are able to view live access to jail information and see the most recent bookings listed chronologically, search by first and last name, age and gender, as well as alphabetically. Users can also see a full list of real-time warrants (including child support), each with the ability to be shared on social media so the community can help law enforcement apprehend wanted individuals.

Registered sex offenders in the community are viewable, including, mug shots, charges and mapping of their city block. Users can easily report crime tips directly to the Sheriff's Office. This feature is also integrated throughout the warrant listings; therefore users may easily report a sighting of a wanted person.



# **CORRECTION DIVISION**

Oversight and management of a correctional facility of any kind is a huge responsibility. The safety of the employees of the Broome County Sheriff Office and the security of the inmates they supervise are a top priority. Our members are challenged regularly on this front. The correctional facility's average daily population rose from 493 in 2012 to 505 in 2013. Due to the rise in the inmate population over the last 16 years, the Administration was able to secure funding to expand the correctional facility. The funding includes renovating the existing indoor gymnasium into two dormitory style housing units to hold 24 prisoners each. Each of the dormitories will have its own recreation yard attached. The funding also includes building an additional medical unit which will be able to hold 16 prisoners.

The showers in three housing units were completely resurfaced. The process involved removing the current surface and replacing it with fresh paint and applying a more durable sealant. We were able to purchase two new transportation vans with security inserts. The facility administration took great strides to reduce the operational costs where possible while still maintaining a safe and secure environment.

The Correction Division received its reaccreditation through the NYS Sheriff Association. The medical unit which is operated by Correctional Medical Care, also received its reaccreditation through the National Commission on Correctional Health Care. Accreditation is not easy to maintain. A lot of dedication and hard work from the staff goes into the accreditation process.

## Corrections Training Unit 2013

The Corrections Training Unit of the Broome County Sheriff's Office was staffed by one Sergeant. Since the corrections profession is continuing to change, the Corrections Training Unit has sustained its endeavor to meet these changes. The 320 hour Basic Course for Correction Officers graduated 11 Officers from 4 different counties. The training unit certified 7 new instructors who will assist with instruction during the academy and annual in-service training. The training for the Emergency Response Team continues to be directed at the always present threat of physical violence within the correctional facility. Annual in-service and firearm training was conducted for line staff and supervisory personnel.

## Medical Services

The Health Services Unit of the Correctional Facility has a comprehensive medical unit approach that combines both the medical services and forensic mental health service under one provider. Correctional Medical Care is contracted with the county to provide these services. The facility and county has benefited by this continuity of care. The unit is working very well in meeting the demanding needs of a growing population, while continuing to control costs.

The Medical Unit has worked hard in maintaining the high level of services demanded by the Sheriff's Office. Both the medical and mental health are accredited by the National Commission on Correctional Health Care (NCCHC). Accreditation is the process of external peer review in which NCCHC, a private, not-for-profit organization, grants public recognition to correctional institutions that meet its nationally accepted *Standards for Health Services*. Through the accreditation process, NCCHC renders a professional judgment regarding health services provided and assists correctional facilities in their continued improvement.

**Criminal Investigations Unit**  
**Corrections Division**

The Criminal Investigations Unit (CIU) is a sub unit of the Corrections Division, made up of select officers trained as investigators. These officers receive two weeks of criminal investigations training as well as periodic specialized training in areas that are relevant to their duties.

Currently, there are fourteen officers assigned to the unit as well as one Sergeant assigned as Direct Supervisor and one Lieutenant as Direct Command oversight for the unit, with the Captain and Major of the division completing the command structure. The officers comprising the unit conduct investigational duties in addition to their normal correctional assignments.

CIU is tasked with the responsibility of investigating any criminal activity that occurs within the Sheriff's Correctional Facility and the arrest and prosecution of the perpetrators. The unit is also responsible for the collection and verification of gang intelligence, as well as maintaining the Broome County Security Risk Group Database. This database is a resource for county wide law enforcement on gang activity and gang intelligence.

The Supervisor of the unit is also tasked with conducting background investigations on all potential new officer hires and civilian employees for the Corrections Division. Further, the Supervisor is responsible for all divisional internal investigations, acting as Internal Affairs for the Corrections Division. The Captain and Major of the division are in direct command of these responsibilities conducted by the Supervisor.

The unit also functions as an arm of criminal intelligence, assisting local detective divisions and other police agencies with relevant information for ongoing investigations or identification purposes.

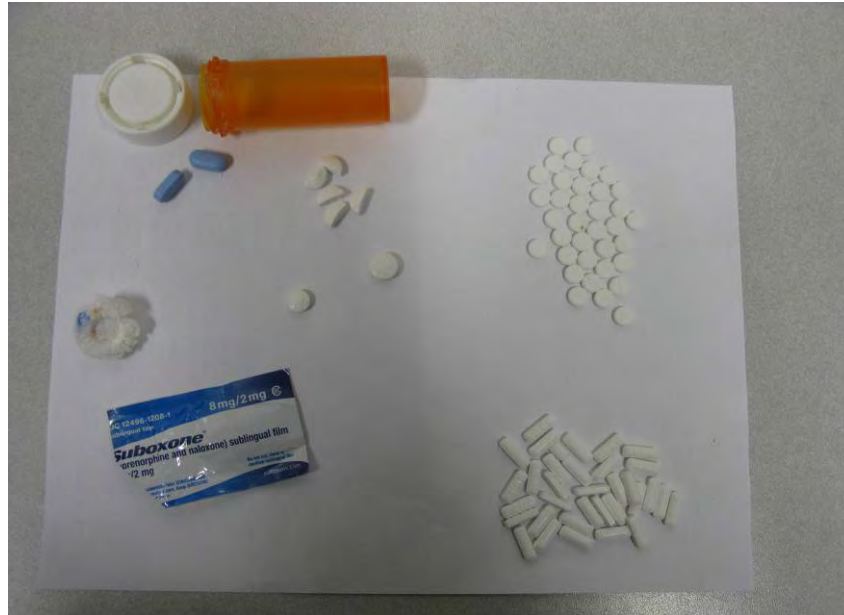

**Warning Letters Written:**

10 Warning Letters were issued. These letters are sent to prisoners warning them to cease all contact with persons who are being harassed or annoyed by them. This letter is sent prior to opening a Harassment charge against the prisoner.

**Security Risk Group/Gang Management:**

A portion of the responsibility of the Correction Investigations Unit is to proactively collect, evaluate and disseminate security related gang intelligence that exists among the offender population. The unit works closely with law enforcement agencies in gang related crimes; not only to prevent potentially dangerous incidents within the correctional facility, but also as a proven benefit to public safety. In 2013, we housed inmates who had gang affiliations with such groups as the Bloods, Crips, Latin Kings, Arien Nation, Neta's, and Outlaw Motorcycle Gangs. Members of the unit interviewed 56 security risk group affiliates. The individuals interviewed were entered into the security risk group data base which is maintained by the Correction Investigations Unit.

**Employment Background Investigations Conducted:**

Employment background investigations for prospective hires are conducted by the CIU Supervisor and selected members of that Unit. Twelve Total Backgrounds were conducted. Nine officers were hired as a result of the background investigations conducted in 2013.

## INMATE DISCIPLINARY PROCESS

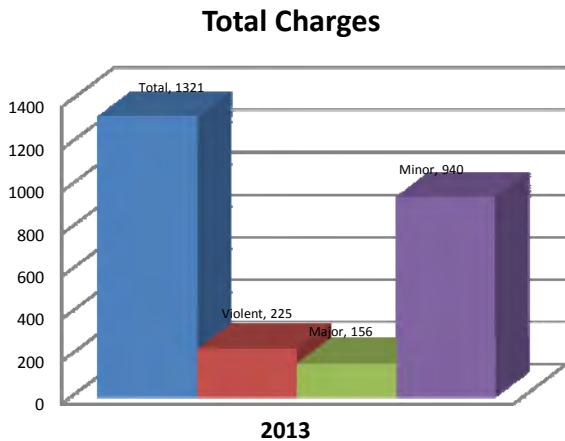
The position of Hearing Officer is vital to the safe and secure operation of the facility. The staff that makes up the team ranges from the line officer, the Programs Sgt., Security Lieutenants, and the Jail Administrator. This structure provides for timely assessment of the inmates actions along with lawful due process. Jails must be able to respond to an infraction of their rules quickly and decisively. Although the courts insist that the disciplinary process follow certain steps, it does not require courtroom-like formality. A process respected by both staff and inmates alike benefits the institution.

The chart represents the disciplinary charges that inmates pled guilty and waived their right to a formal discipline hearing

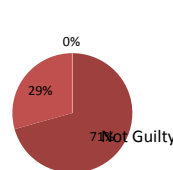

## INMATE GRIEVANCE PROGRAM

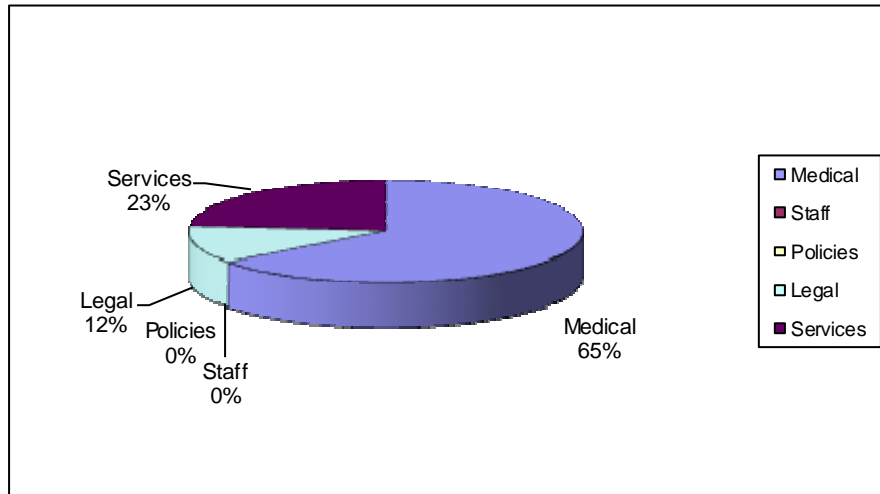
In order to provide an effective and impartial procedure for the timely resolution of inmate complaints, the chief administrative officer of each local correctional facility shall establish, implement and maintain a formal inmate grievance program. Every effort shall be made to resolve inmate complaints in an informal manner.

The term “grievance” is defined as a written inmate complaint concerning either written or unwritten facility policies, procedures, rules, practices, programs or the action or inaction of any person within the facility. Dispositions, surcharges, and sanctions resulting from disciplinary hearings and administrative segregation housing decisions cannot be the subject of a grievance. The chief administrative officer or his designee ensures that each grievance is investigated to the extent necessary by an impartial person. Failure to supply sufficient information or evidence within two days shall be cause to deny the grievance. Grievances regarding dispositions or sanctions from disciplinary hearings, administrative segregation housing decisions, issues that are outside the authority of the chief administrative officer to control, or complaints pertaining to

an inmate other than the inmate actually filing the grievance are not grievable and may be returned to the inmate by the grievance coordinator. Such grievances may not be appealed to the chief administrative officer or the Citizens' Policy and Complaint Review Council (Appeal to the Commission of Correction). A copy shall also be given to the members of the Council for their review. If such determination is in favor of the grievant as a matter of law, the chairperson of the Citizens' Policy and Complaint Review Council shall direct the chief administrative officer to comply with the grievance and provide an appropriate remedy.

## Weekender Work Program

As in past years, the Weekend Work Program continues to provide a valuable asset to the Broome County community. This is fulfilled by using county sentenced inmates in community service operations in Broome County. As you may or may not be aware, the inmates are sentenced to weekends only. They report to the correctional facility on Saturday & Sunday at 7:00 am and are finished at 3:00 pm, at which time they go home. They do this each and every weekend until they complete their sentence. When an inmate is sentenced by the court to work in the program, instead of serving their sentence in the jail, they report to the correctional facility and go out to work with an officer in a designated area within the county. They sign an agreement in court to follow all the rules given to them, or they risk being violated by the court and resented to what is called straight time. Straight time is when they would have to serve their entire sentence in the correctional facility. By implementing the Weekender Work Program for inmates with lesser charges, the county saves money by not having to board inmates. Additionally, the inmate does not lose the job they may already have thus making them more productive in society. The services of the Weekender Work Program are available to any “not-for-profit” organization in Broome County. This program has helped put back valuable hours of labor into the community from individuals who have committed minor crimes therefore being a cost effective operation to the not-for-profit organization and Broome County by not having to pay employees to accomplish this work.

Contained within the Identification Division is the Pistol Permit Office, which handles all aspects of issuance and maintenance of pistol permits for the public. This Division is staffed as follows:

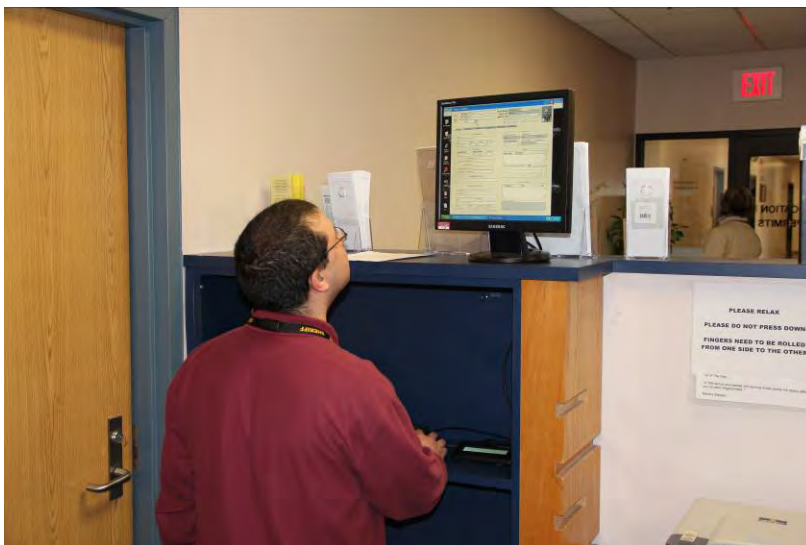

# CIVIL DIVISION

The Broome County Sheriff's Office Civil Enforcement Division is responsible for the enforcement of all civil processes in Broome County which include summonses, property executions, evictions, income executions and subpoenas just to name a few. The Courts in Broome County and the surrounding counties depend on our deputies to handle matters received from various Towns, Cities, Supreme, Surrogates and Family Courts. Our division often receives orders of protections, summons and petitions and other orders from all counties in New York, as well as other states requesting us to affect service for them within our county.

In 2013 the Civil Division brought in 7,157 cases. This was an increase of 210 services from the previous year. The Civil Division processed 1,160 summonses up from 2012 by over 200,980 evictions, 59 Property Executions and 1,876 income executions. Family Court services, which include neglect, juvenile delinquency cases, support petitions, orders of protection, sexual abuse petitions, modification hearings, and other orders and petitions totaled 2,023 services. A more detailed breakdown of the services is included in this report.

When attempting to effect service, our deputies spend vast amounts of time investigating and locating people to be served. Incorrect addresses, names and information are given to our Office and it becomes a time-consuming process to search for the correct information. Oftentimes, the deputies must send inquires to local post offices or question friends, relatives and neighbors of the address in which they must service. They will also investigate former employers to seek

current information or research names in the office from the computer and other resources that are available to them. As a result of their countless hours of investigation, 6,869 services out of 7157 were completed leaving only 203 services were unable to be served. Eighty Five services were returned. These were at the request of the courts or attorneys.

The Civil Enforcement Division handles numerous warrants of evictions for Broome County. The process for enforcing an eviction would include the deputies overseeing the actual removal of a tenant's personal property. It would also include the enforcement of both the landlord and tenants' rights and seeing that proper procedures and laws are being followed. A deputy may spend anywhere from 1 to 4 hours, and sometimes more, on each eviction. This depends upon the situation. On the occasion of enforcing a warrant for a business such as a restaurant or an established business, our deputies have spent 6 to 10 hours assuring the removal of equipment, furniture, and inventory.

Revenue brought in for services in 2013 was \$154,885 for Sheriff fees, including mileage. This is an increase of \$11,150 from the previous year and \$158,481 for poundage totaling \$313,366. The Civil Division took in a total amount of \$469,706. This includes money collected and dispersed to Judgment Creditors

The Civil Office processed transactions for open civil accounts, of which 1,877 were new income executions and 52 were new property executions. This represents a 4.5% increase over 2012. Income executions that required additional service upon employers (generating additional fee income) amounted to 1089 cases. One thousand seven forty five cases were closed as satisfied, nulla bona's and balance nulla bona's.

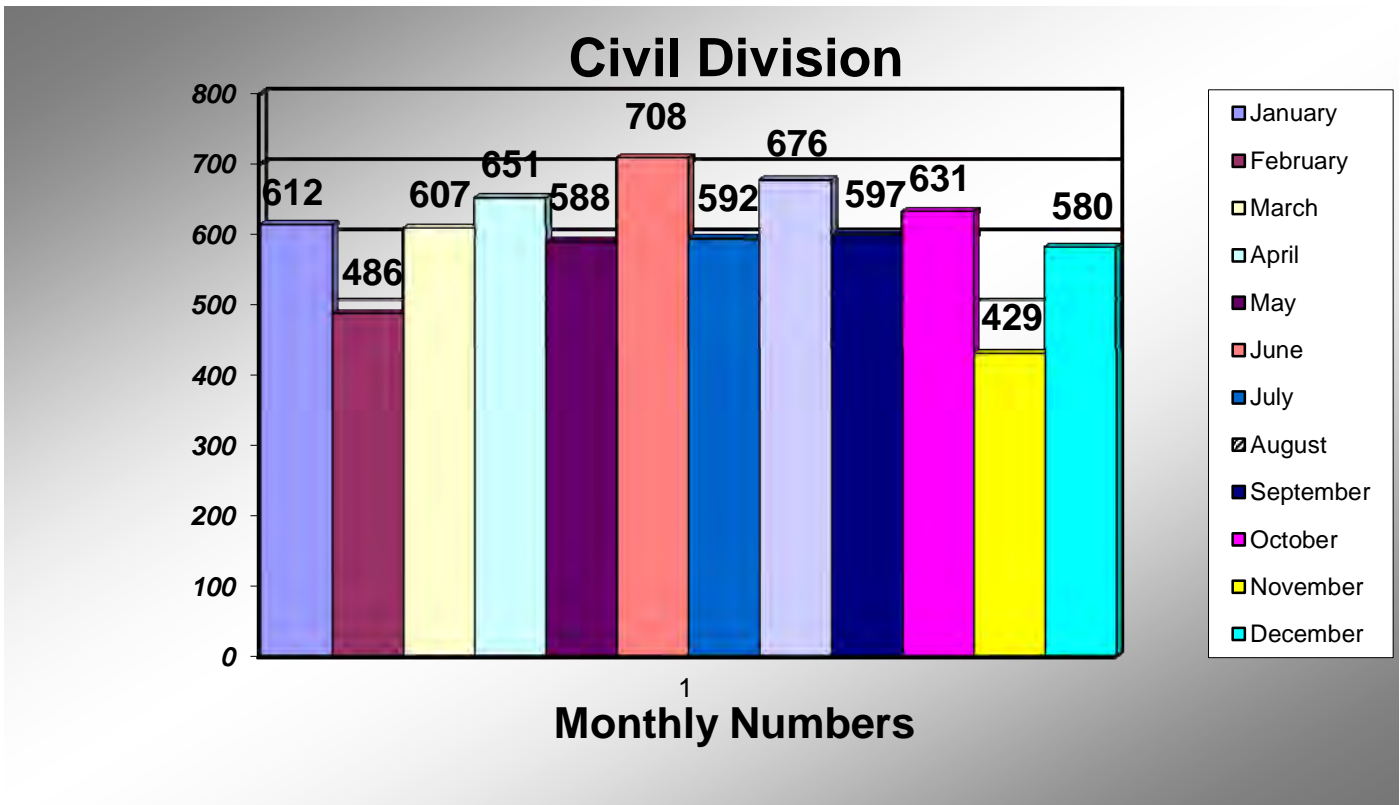
The number of receipts processed in 2013 was 26,713. This was approximately 102 payments per day. Disbursements relevant to these accounts amounted to 2903. Which is approximately 242 per month. Sheriff's fees (Poundage – 5% of all payments received) amounted to \$158,481. Fees generated for Income and Property Executions amounted to \$157,188. This total of \$314,820 is revenue generated by the Civil Office.

The County Attorney's Office, Real Property Tax, District Attorney's Office, County Health Department, Support Collection and the Department of Social Services seek the Civil Enforcement Office in processing and servicing their legal process and violation notices. These county offices also seek assistance in service and procedure of Civil Law.

# FISCAL OFFICE

The Fiscal Office maintains all financial functions for the Broome County Sheriff's Office. The accounts maintained are Commissary/Inmate Funds, Bail & Fine Funds, Pistol Permits & Identification Funds, Records Funds and all Civil Account Funds. The staff assigned is as follows:

One Fiscal Manager  
One Principal Account Clerk  
One Senior Account Clerk/Typist

The Fiscal Office maintains the payroll records for the 244 employees of the Sheriff's Office. This involves auditing and inputting all data including overtime, shift premium, vacation and sick time. A separate attendance file is kept on each employee and updated on a weekly basis.

Worker's Compensation files and all necessary reports are also maintained in the Fiscal Office. In 2013, the business office processed 23 Worker Compensation Claims. Of these, 3 were from the Highway Patrol/Detective Divisions and 20 were from the Correction Division

All Accounts Payable for the Sheriff's Divisions are processed through the Business Office. Purchase order and claim voucher records are maintained through an Excel program. This allows for up-to-date data needed to make necessary financial decisions at the fingertips of the division heads. In 2013, 295 purchase orders and 864 claim vouchers were processed.

There were 705 bails and fines totaling \$738,130 receipted by the Business Office. This money, along with paperwork, is disbursed to the proper courts twice a month. .

All inmates and commissary funds are processed through the Fiscal Office. Daily funds are received, deposited and posted to the inmate accounts through the Swanson Banking System. A total of \$615,874 was receipted through the inmate funds account and \$610,489 was disbursed. Swanson Corporation processes all commissary orders and delivers the orders to the facility. This procedure has helped diminish inventory shortages and employee expenses.

Receipts amounting to \$143,310 were processed through the commissary funds account and \$219,36 was disbursed in 2013. Net sales generated from the commissary account for 2013 were \$417,475 and commissions from these sales amounted to \$140,897. This is an increase in commissions of 28%. These commissions are used to purchase items for the inmates. For example, this year two inmate transport vans were purchased from this account saving taxpayer dollars.

# RECORDS DIVISION

The Records Division of the Broome County Sheriff's Office is responsible for the recording and maintaining of all official records and documents relative to the police operations of the Broome County Sheriff's Office. This Division is responsible for entering all Incident/Case and Accident Reports investigated by the officers of the Broome County Sheriff's Office into the AS-400 Computer System and filing monthly reports to the Division of Criminal Justice Services in Albany using the Incident Based Reporting System. Personnel that are assigned to the Records Division are as follows:

2 Keyboard Specialists  
1 Clerk (part-time)

This Division provides records for the District Attorney's Office, the Department of Social Services, Probation, New York State Parole, as well as out of state departments of the same kind. This office is also responsible for providing the public with copies of motor vehicle accident reports, New York State Incident Reports and photographs as required. We now offer the public the opportunity to purchase motor vehicle accident reports on-line. Accident reports and incident reports are also available through the Records Office at a fee of .25 cents per page. It is required that more sensitive reports be requested through the County Freedom of Information Office. In 2013, the Records Division processed 408 Freedom of Information Requests and provided over 4,100 reports to several other agencies, including those listed above.

Additionally, the Records Division is responsible for providing an alarm permit to the residents and businesses in our jurisdiction who maintain a burglar alarm on their premises. This Division also maintains an account of all avoidable alarms occurring at these locations, and provides billing as required. There is no fee for an alarm permit; however, fees do come into effect for excessive avoidable alarms within each calendar year. A breakdown of these fees is as listed below:

Alarm permit ----- No charge  
First, second, third & fourth avoidable alarm – No charge  
Fifth alarm ----- \$25.00 charge  
Sixth alarm (and any thereafter) ----- \$50.00 charge each
